

The new Tournament schedule should create an outlet for competitive play hitherto only dreamed about in this area. It provides a series of major tournaments where every player in the state will be given an opportunity to compete with the best, and make his mark in our 'hall of fame".

The program consists of two types of major tournaments, the so-called "Open" tournaments, and the "Area" tournaments. The only exception will be the Pacific Northwest Expert's, which will be strictly invitational. The Puget Sound Open heads the list for the first group here, and the Oregon Open in Portland. The Washington State and Speed, Seattle City, and Northwest Washington will all be considered as "Area"

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tournaments. Others are in the planning stage, such as an Olympic tournament, and another in the Tacoma area.

Other "Opens" are left up to individual clubs or cities desiring to sponsor them, and could be named after the city. For these to be official, the plans should be submitted and approved by the WCF at least 90 days in advance.

The first of the major tournaments will the Washington State, and basically, this may be the finest of all. The new Seattle Chess Club is ideally located for the event, and has facilities for handling a large number of players. Each team in the Puget Sound League should at least strive to have all of its team members compete. In addit tion, special invitations will go out to other clubs in the state.

Remember, if you have an ordinary, self-starting electric clock, bring it! Dick Allen, the Tournament Director, has the apparatus for connecting them as chess clocks.

What are the qualities of a good chess player? I won't attempt to answer that, but I think that Vernon Holmes has them, whatever they are. Finalist in the 1944 Great Lakes tourney, twice Champion of Treasure Island in 1945, Tacoma Champ in '46 and Runner up in '47, third in the '48 Puget Sound Tournament, and Tacoma Champion again this year - that qualifies him for that "chess expert" title don't you think?

Not only is Vernon Holmes tops as a player, but also in administrative ability and ingenuity as well. Being Tacoma Chess Club President, he shows his skill at the former, and Tacoma players will testify to his "ingenuity." I understand that his "Rapid Transit" clock with the two-tone buzzes has tempted some members to try the window as the easiest way out.

Vernon hasn't bothered the boys at the club rooms much of late, he has been too busy teaching his son how to play chess. That takes quite a bit of time, since Loren is only nine months old, but he is learning fast. After all, look who he has as a teacher!

Was it "Ray Hiscox who said: "The best game I played was the one I lost."

We wouldn't want this to go further, but we saw this in the paper the other day: "Eugene ZZaskonovitch calmly played and lost his 134 move tournement game, got up from the board and wnet raving mad. Hedical authorities have him under observation.

KINGS AND PAWNS IN SOVIET RUSCIA Olaf Ulvestad

The first week in September the American chess group boarded a Russian ship and sailed to Loningrad by way of Helsinki, Finland. The other passengers were Swedes, Finns, and Russians. Incidently, learned that Swedes make up a fair percentage of the Finnish During the trip to Leningrad we were mainly concerned with the many pleasures of the voyage and with last-minute chessmatch preparations. I observed only casually the Russians who played dominoes with such enthusiasm on the sun-warmed decks.

Twenty four hours were spent in Helsinki. During that time a Finnish Chess delegation entertained us and showed us aroung the city in private cars. Among other things, we saw the Finnish Houses of Parliament, which are considered some of the most beauti-

ful of the world's public buildings.

We sailed into the war-scarred harbor of Kronstadt (the naval base which leads to Leningrae) on the morning of the fourth day from Stockholm; we docked at Lemingrad before meon on the same day. The Soviet immigration officials came aboard shortly and started a thorough "screening" of all passengers except our party. Evidently special arrangements had been made to expedite our entry. Oral and written examinations of the other passengers were lengthy, apparently routine, and seemingly unnecessary. The incoming Russians appeared to take all this as a matter of course. Their faces in the long and lasting queues were almost expressionless, despite the tedious interrogations and form-filling.

Our baggage was off in midpafternoon. We waited to step onto a bleak dock on a dreary, rainy day. Awaiting us on the dock was a group of Russian interpreters and others assigned to our party. They had an old bus for us and two American army type trucks for

our baggage.

Leningrad is beautifully laid out on a river. While coming into the city I noticed the lack of war-damage repair, as well as the signs of rebuilding. Host noticeable was the absence of new construction. Building material, especially glass, was scarce, if the boarded and papered apertures which were formerly windows were any indication.

We stayed overnight at the finest hotel in Leningrad. This hotel and the Hotel Metropole in Moscow are both of pre-revolutionary construction. Shortly after we "checked in" our passports were taken up, with no reasons given. Due to the activities of arrival, none of us bothered to ask an explanation! Dinner was served that evening on a scale that one secs rarely, even in films. An enormous, long table was used. On it were huge quantities of nors d' oeuvres, several kinds of drinks from "soft" to "hard" (these included wines champagne, and vodka) and a culinary triumph in the form of a huge salmon, which had been cleaned, baked, skinned and sliced from head to tail, and laid out complete on a enormous (I was later told that there are five different classes or standards of living in the USSR, and that guests of the Soviet Union enjoy "class one", which is the standard enjoyed by Stalin, Molotov, and other top-ranking Soviet leaders).
