BOB STORK IS 1950 PUGET SOUND OPEN CHAMPION

Out of a strong field of twenty players emerged State Champion Bob Stork to win the Puget Sound Open Tournament at Tacoma, April 15th and 16th. In second place came Jack Strong of Portland who edged out Gerald Schain by virtue of an extra S. B. point. Fourth was Chas. Joachim and fifth, Dean Bollman.

Last years winner, Jim Amidon, failed to show up to defend his title. Nor did 1948 champ Jim Schmitt compete.

Storks win proved beyond a doubt his winning of the State Championship was no "fluke", and that his chess is of high caliber.

The tournament was smoothly and efficiently run by Director R. H. Collins, that is, except for one game in which Dick Allen and Joe Cerretelli tried to outdo one another by laying down smoke screens. The standings:

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REHBERG SAYS:

Gioachino Greco was an outstanding Italian chess player who published a collection of his games in 1669. After his death Italy produced no master players for many years.

In other parts of Europe however the game increased in popularity. It was the main pastime in the coffee houses of London and Parix in the 18th century.

Andre Philidor now comes on the scene with his brilliant play. He divided his time between London and Paris. He set down his theories of chess in a book to wit: "Analyze du Jeu des Echecs".

At this time Italy again produced some talented players. The best known of them being Ponziani, E. del Rio and G. Lolli.

Philidor died in 1795 (whether on the scaffold of the guillotine or not is not known).

The term French defence originated in 1831 at which time a French team defeated an English team in a postal match. This team was led by Pierre de Saint Amant.

The Scotch game comes from a London-Edinburgh match played in 1824. This period also brings about the name of Howard Staunton a famous English player.

Staunton won the unofficial championship of Europe in 1843 by defeating the French Saint-Amant. He later published Staunton's "Chessplayers Handbook". This along with the German Von Bilguer's work "Handbuch" published in 1843 first gave the names of the various openings in an orderly fashion.

But it wasn't until 1851 that an International Tourney was held. It was an elimination affair and won by Adolph Anderssen of Berlin.

EN PASSANT

The Washington Chess Federation is a little over two years old, and like all federations it is made strong by its membership. The Puget Sound League is the backbone of the WCF at present althoughest clubs in other sections of the state are considering taking out memberships.

We who are members of the WCF know the benefits that we have received have far exceeded the cost. It's the only thing I've ever heard of where you get out more than you put in. All we have to do is prove it to them in advance, but it's like trying to explain

to a blindman how everything would look if he could see.

The WASHINGTON CHESS LETTER is doing most of this "spadework" and the Washington Chess Federation is beamishly proud of its very precocious youngster. In fact, it has been so successful that the editorial and management staff has been given the green light on some improvements such as the lithographed cover of this issue. Naturally, this process ent ils more expense than the mimeograph, and it may not be possible to publish every issue in this format. However, it will be done as often as the budget permits -- without raising the dues. It is much better to get more members than to sock the present ones harder.

At present, there is only one official circulation method for the WCL-it is given free to embers of the Washington Chess Federation. Mr. Peter Husby, the publisher and circulation manager has come up with a very interesting promotional idea. He offers to send the WCL to clubs at \$1.00/dozen, in order to get it into new hands as quickly as possible. This is below cost to the WCF and does not carry the priviliges of either personal or club membership. It is recommended by the WCF that these be sold at 15% each or given away to prospective members when obsolete. Here is a fine opportunity to plug your club and its treasury, and at the same time insure that the Jashington Chess Letter will continue to expand and improve.

By the way, Mr. Raleigh who is Treasurer of the WCF, tells me that some of the clubs in the luget Jound League have not paid their 1949 registration fees (\$5.00) nor their JCF club dues (\$5.00) for 1949, even though competing in scheduled matches and enjoying the status of WCF membership. This is no doubt an oversight. If you're not sure, check with your club treasurer. Mr. Raleigh's

address is 4318 Densmore Lve., Seattle 3, Wash.

The expenses were heavier this year mainly due to the purchase of PSL trophies not only for 1950 but also for the previous years: 1947, 1948, and 1949. This was necessary because the plaque for the Fuget Sound League has always been considered a permanent record of the Fuget Sound League and not a trophy. There were some very interesting runors floating around, and an informal director's meeting was held to head off the gathering storm. A precedent making decision was made by the WCF officers in creation of a Fuget Sound League trophy to be awarded each year to the club winning first place in the tournament. In case any club gets its name on it three times, the trophy becomes their permanent property. As I understand it, this does not have to be in succession—correct me if I'm wrong. At any rate, judging from the expressions on the faces of the recipients in the cover illustration, the decision will not be appealed...
