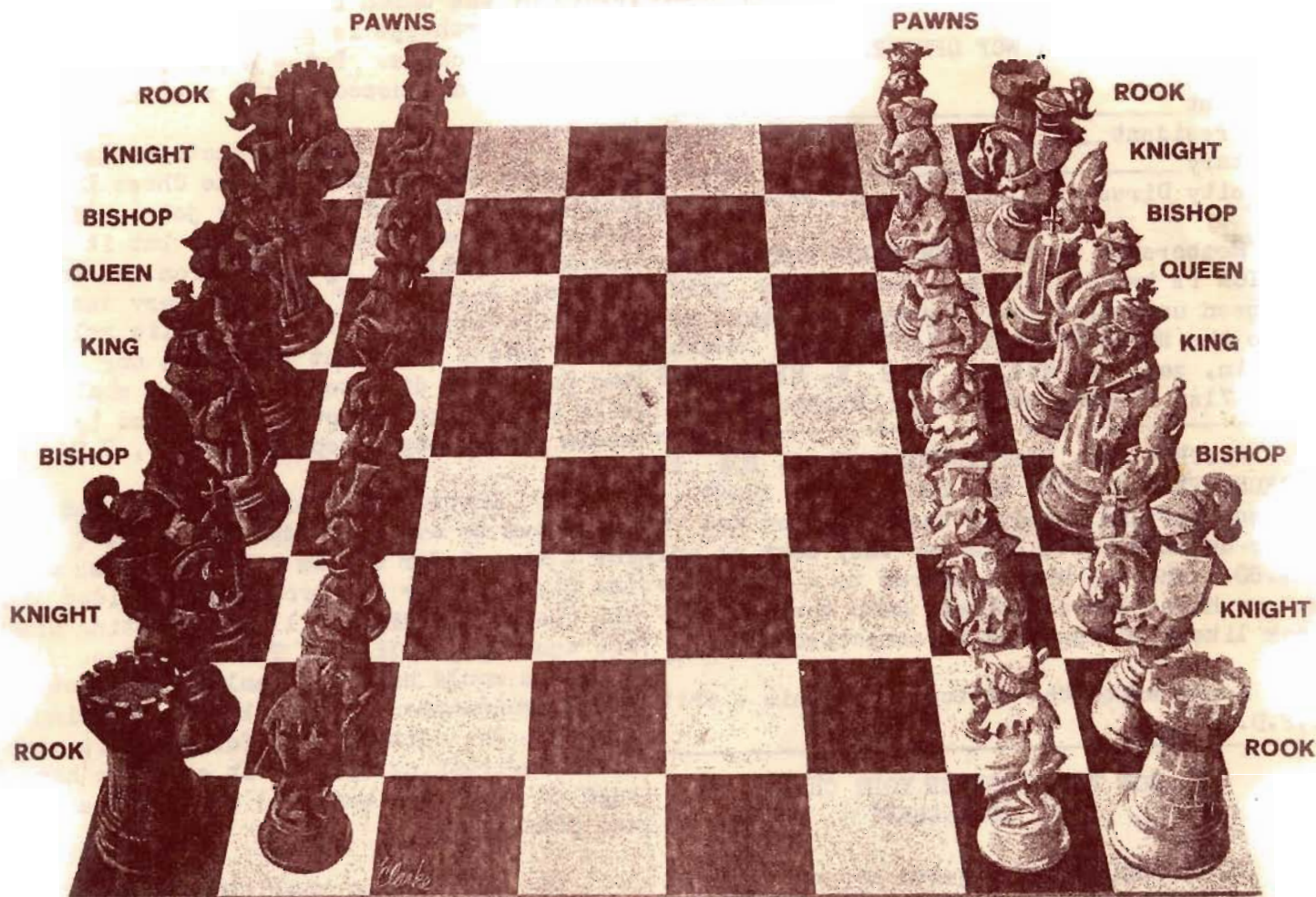

HOW TO ADVERTISE YOUR CHESS
TOURNAMENT

DENNIS SCHAVE of Hoquiam was on the ball
and got three notices in the CHESS LETTER for
his First Annual Grays Harbor Open. In con-
trast we got a notice on the coming PUGET SO-
UND OPEN a week after the February issue went
into the mail. It is supposed to take place
March 20-21. In order to get this tournament
information to you it would have been necess-
ary for us to start working on this CHESS LET-
TER immediately after finishing the last only
because someone was too lazy to send us a let-
ter a week sooner. Similar feelings regarding
the following letter. It should have been re-
ceived in time for the February issue.

ANNUAL MEETING SET FOR APRIL 4TH.

Please, could you be so kind, to complete
the March issue of the Chess Letter as soon as
you can, because we should include an invitati-
on to our next meeting on April 4, 1965. I
believe this day is not Easter Sunday. Could
you also get the permission of the Seattle C.
C. to hold this general meeting on their prem-
ises.

I am sorry that this meeting will coin-
cide with the Interstate Open, but this fact
cannot be helped.

As far as I see at the present time, "the
state of the union is in good shape" and the
Pacific Northwest is going to become a great
society in chess. But - a few issues will
have to be discussed at the meeting:

(1) Increase chess promotion also with
publicity to the public. The Chess Letter is
doing a recognized publicity job as far as
its subscribers are concerned, but it doesn't
reach the public. My suggestion is, to com-
bine the position of the secretary and of the
public relations man. This public relations
man's duties shall not interfere nor overlap
the publicity director's job, but shall con-
sist in keeping the public informed by the
media of newspaper reports, radio, T.V., etc.

(2) Introduction of the Kashdan advocat-
ed system to avoid grandmaster draws (4 pts.
for a win, 2 for a draw & 1 for a loss which
the Chess Letter has proved a poor idea since
ALL draws including brilliant fighting draws
are equally penalized. The only place such
a system would have any real meaning would be
where grandmasters played before a paying aud-
ience. - The editor.) As for using it merely
as a tie-breaking system, it seems we have en-
ough of those now and good drawn games still
are penalized.

(3) Mr. Joachim would like a third level
for the SEAFAIR. The public could play at
the Food Circus while the dyed in the wool
players met at Boeing Cafeteria for serious
chess. This would keep the game before the
public eye and the chess players elsewhere it
is assumed, but with little publicity, could
play the game as it should be played - in a
quiet location. Since little or nothing is
really lost by the real players, we say fine.

(4) A resolution by the Wash. Chess Fed-
eration directed to the USCF to get FIDE to
try to change the World Championship set up.

MCCORMICK WINS NORTHWEST SPEED TITLE

JAMES MCCORMICK invaded his old home town on February 6th to capture the 1965 Northwest Speed Chess Tournament title. His score of 15-1 at the Liberty Park Community Center in Renton topped the 9 man double round robin by a full two games. After winning 6 in a row, McCormick was stopped by GLENN MULLER, himself a former Washington State speed champion. This loss did not seem to disturb McCormick as he went on to win his remaining nine games.

CLARK HARMON, who finished second, had a rougher time. It took him eleven rounds before he regained second place after losing to LIEF KARELL in the second round. Harmon's other two losses in compiling his 13-3 score were both at the hands of McCormick.

The surprise of the tournament was Lief Karell of Portland. He was ranked sixth at the beginning of the tournament, but that did not stop him from scoring $11\frac{1}{2}$ - $4\frac{1}{2}$ and taking third place money and half of the upset prizes. He lost two to McCormick, one to Harmon one to DEANE MOORE, and drew with Portland's DENNY JENQUIN in the third round.

Since the tournament was a double round robin, upset prizes were awarded for rounds 1 and 10, 2 and 11, 3 and 12, etc. The prizes were awarded on this basis to BUZ EDDY (one prize), first round win over DEANE MOORE of Portland, LIEF KARELL (three prizes), second round win over CLARK HARMON, twelfth round win over DENNY JENQUIN, and seventh round win over DEANE MOORE. GLENN MULLER (one prize), eighth round win over JIM MCCORMICK. EDDIE SONIER (one prize), sixth round win over DEANE MOORE. There were no upsets in rounds 4 and 13, 5 and 14, and 9 and 18. Tournament director CLARK HARMON had few problems, his only wish - more players.

MCCORMICK 1965 STATE CHAMP

JIM MCCORMICK won the 1965 Washington State Chess Championship played at the Seattle Chess Club Feb. 20-21-22. Jim scored 5-1 in the seven player round-robin winning 4, losing no games and yielding only two draws to VIKTORS PUPOLS and ANDY SCHOENE.

Saturday morning, Feb. 20th, seven of the eight qualifiers (top 8 Washington men in the Washington Open) appeared to try to win the coveted title. Only MIKE FRANETT , who finished 7th in the Open, was unable to participate.

As in all round-robin events, the pairing order was decided by lot and as fate would have it the annual Pupols- McCormick duel was set for the first round. The time-control for the tournament was 35 in 2 and this game along with at least half of the games in the event went to adjournment. In other first round games ANDY SCHOENE dumped LOREN MEIERDING and CLARK HARMON developed an advantage over BILL KIPLINGER before adjournment. MIKE FARKAS, seventh player in the tournament, had the first round bye.

In the second round, Schoene won from Pupols in short order, McCormick mated Harmon in less than 30 moves, and Meierding salvaged a lost position against Farkas & went on to win the game. Kiplinger had the second round bye.

Upon resuming the first round adjournments, Harmon pressed his advantage for a win over Kiplinger. In the Pupols-McCormick game, Pupols had 3 passed pawns in the center for a piece. Pupols arrived with only 8 minutes left for 20 moves and McCormick, after a quick 3 move series, was able to establish a draw.

At the conclusion of two rounds Schoene led with 2-0 while McCormick had $1\frac{1}{2}$ - $\frac{1}{2}$. Other

scores were: Harmon 1-1, Meierding 1-1 Pupols $\frac{1}{2}$ - $1\frac{1}{2}$, Kiplinger 0-1 and Farkas 0-1.

Sunday morning saw Kiplinger win from Farkas, Harmon gain an edge over Meierding before adjournment, and Schoene- McCormick play 35 moves to a relatively even position.

In the 4th round McCormick won from Kiplinger, Pupols beat Farkas, and Schoene drew with Harmon.

McCormick had the fifth round bye and after assessing his chances, offered Schoene a draw in their adjourned game which was accepted.

In the fifth round Farkas failed to appear and lost via forfeit to Harmon, Kiplinger held Schoene to a draw, and Pupols won from Meierding on a 53rd move time - pressure blunder.

Resuming the third round Harmon-Meierding adjourned game, Harmon pressed his advantage to win quickly.

After five rounds McCormick had 3-1 , Schoene $3\frac{1}{2}$ - $1\frac{1}{2}$, Harmon $3\frac{1}{2}$ - $1\frac{1}{2}$, Pupols $2\frac{1}{2}$ - $1\frac{1}{2}$, Kiplinger $1\frac{1}{2}$ - $2\frac{1}{2}$, Meierding 1-3, Farkas 0-4.

In round six Kiplinger downed Meierding while McCormick defeated Farkas and Pupols developed a slight advantage over Harmon before adjournment. Pupols later won this adjourned game technically via time-forfeit.

In the 7th and final round McCormick won the title by beating Meierding, Schoene beat Farkas and Kiplinger upset Pupols.

RAY TRAINOR, who finished 5th in the six player field, gave Cornelius his hardest game before falling after more than 4 hours of play.

In six matches this season against six common opponents, Golden Horde scored 49½-9½ while the defending champion Boeing Chess Club team scored 49-9. Both had perfect 6-0 match records. So the final result when the two powers met should have been very close. But it was not. By adding state champ JIM MCCORMICK to the team, the Golden Horde went on to win by an overwhelming 8 to 2 count.
