## NOURSE REPEATS AS KITSAP COUNTY CHAMPION

In a selected five man, double round robin tournament, Jack Nourse convincingly won the Kitsap County Tournament, his third successive victory, with 6 wins, one loss, and one draw, outdistancing his nearest rival by a full two points. His prestige was even more increased by the strength of the field entered in the tournament this year.

Of even more importance than the playing records of two Kitsap men are their noteworthy contributions in Washington chess organization.

Jack Nourse has long been an organizer on Bainbridge Island, having been the mainstay of the Bainbridge club for years, but his most notable contribution was the organization of the Puget Sound Chess League, for which he was almost wholly responsible, and his work as secretary in the trying first year was outstanding.

His co-worker, George Rehberg, has been the backbone of Bremerton chess, and his work as founder and Editor of the Puget Sound Chess News gave the impetus needed to bring organized chess to the Pacific Northwest.

We owe a lot of thanks to these two leaders in Kitsap and in Washington chess! The combination of two should keep Kitsap one of the leaders in years to come.

The surprise of the tournament was the fine showing of Danskins, who placed second ahead of Charles Hagerkurth, number one man from Bremerton last year, and George Rehberg, who had an enviable record in Puget Sound League match play, who tied for third.

At the last meeting of the Washington Chess Federation the staff of the Everett Chess Letter agreed to change from a club newspaper to one representing the Washington Chess Federation, and changing the name to the Washington Chess Letter. Richard P. Allen was to be Circulation Manager, and handle the details of publication through the staff of the Seattle YMCA, who agreed to do this free of charge with only the material to be furnished by the Federation. Certainly the offer was most generous and was greatly appreciated; but it seems that in most instances when one expects to get something for nothing, one gets --- nothing!

The manuscript for the November issue, 12 pages, was completed about the tenth of that month, and mailed to Seattle for publication. The Editor's work was completed; there remained only the details of stencil cutting, mimeographing, and mailing for the publishers, which under the former staff of the Everett Chess Letter, done in their spare time, required at most -- one week! It is now Eight Weeks overdue!

Kitsap and University have al-

road lost to Tacoma, and Wallingford to Seattle. Everett was rudely trounced by Kitsap, and Skagit upset by Olympia. Apparently the most interesting competition, aside from the two leaders, will be for third or fourth place, as only a combination of upsets should prevent Tacoma and Seattle from again finishing 'one-two'.

Tacoma trounced a badly crippled University team, adding the second scalp to their collection this year and thus far conducting themselves with the fine showing of true champions. Roberts and Au Yong were badly missed by University, and would probably have narrowed the margin had they been competing.
