

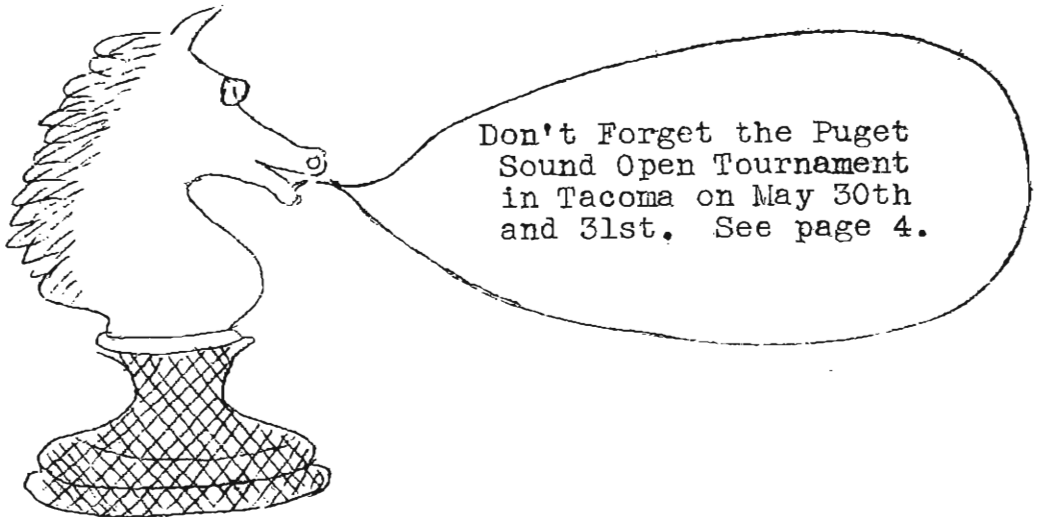

# **C O N T E N T S**

Tournament chess is unquestionably the greatest factor in increasing the strength of players in any given area. Without them, it is practically impossible to bring strong players together for serious chess.

Club, and local city tournaments are the simplest to handle, and provide a stepping stone for larger events. Still, if the stronger players are unable to take advantage of outside competition, they will grow stagnant, and have little chance to improve.

The coming Puget Sound Open tournament fills the need for our area as have none before. Being held under the Swiss System, it is practical to play it on a holiday week-end, and will be able to handle a large number of players during that time. The tournament permits an entry of 64 players without a change in schedule. This should be ample for our needs.

The tournament is apparently well organized, and should operate smoothly, giving maximum enjoyment to the spectators and the contestants. Each club should send a group of players to compete. This is one tournament that ANY player may enter.

## WASHINGTON CHESS LETTER

The North West Washington tournament created a great deal of interest in that area, though necessarily limited to a small group of players, as it was a round robin affair. A similar tournament is planned for the Olympic peninsula, with the Kitsap club as hosts. It should be just as successful.

However, the need is for more state - wide competition. The Puget Sound Open begins to fill the need, but it is only one tournament. The State Championship will help, but if it is again a round robin, it must be limited to a select group of the strongest players. Small invitational round robin tournaments that can be played in a short time should be successful ---- a short time limit could even be imposed to speed up play. Swiss System tournaments will draw more players, as they can easily be completed on a week-end. The speed tournaments can be played in one day with a reasonably large group if handled by a capable Tournament Director.

Think it over.
