

REYBERG once referred to "Demon Chess" with the idea that suppression or attempts to shield young and tender minds from its baleful influence would bring about a renaissance in chess pagentry. Maybe we've been emphasizing the benefits too much and neglecting the wonderful and exciting bad effects of possession by "Demon Chess".
