

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# EDITORIAL

#### UNIVERSITY

Jerry Schain has again won the University of Vashington Chess Club Championship. Jerry, who has consistently played first board for the University team, placed first with a score of 32. He lost only one game.

Second with a score of 31; is James Amidon, former Puget Sound Open Champ.

Third is Kenneth W. Mulford, former University of Washington Chess Champion.

Charles Ballantine, the Washington State Champ took fourth place. In fifth place we find George Stearns.

The University of Tashington Games Committee sponsered the first Annual University of Washington Championship Tournament on April 7, 1951 according to reports. (No results at this writing). They plan to hold this annually with the first prize a large trophy and also the title of University of Tashington Champion.

Formerly the University Chess Club held a quarterly tournament, the title of University of Uashington Champion going to the winner. Now however, winners of Club Tournaments will receive a title of University of Cashington CLUB Champion. The word Club being used to distiguish between tournaments sponsored by the Games Committee and the Chess Club.

#### YAKIMA

Oliver La Freniere is the new Yakima High School Chess Champion, winning the newly organized High School Chess Tournament. His very excellent score was 14 wins and no losses.

The runner-up was Dick Dexter with a score of 13 to 1. His only loss being a defeat at the hands of the new Champion.

Villiam Hoge and Eli Triesman were the contestants considered most likely to be battling it out for first place in the Makima City Championship Tournament that was scheduled to be played from the 2nd of April to May 7.

# REPORT

As your Publicity Director, I would like to ask one of you from each Club to write to your local paper announcing the various chess events in your locality. A followup article giving the results of events should also be sent promptly to the papers.

Shortly after being given the job of Publicity Director, I dashed to the library, to read up on the idiosyncrasies of our friends, the EDITORS of NEWSPAPERS.

It seems that they have RULES and REQUIREMENTS which must be followed or else your article doesn't stand too good a chance of being published.

The rules are simple and I pass them along to you for the benefit of the organiza-

1. The 5 Ws, i.e. What, Who, When, Why and Where. For example: The Blank Chees Club will attempt to defeat Mr. Olaf Ulvestad, Tuesday evening, Sept. 8th at the new YMCA building. Mr. Ulvestad will give a demonstration of his chessboard skill there on that date and the public is cordially invited. The Chessmaster will play a crowd estimated to include at least forty players. He will also play one blincfold game.

The exhibition will be the first of several for Ulvestad, who is preparing for the National Championship Tournament in March, 1952.

- 2. Always give the correct spelling of proper names and include the first names. But never refer to a player by his nickname unless he is well known by such a name.
  - 3. If writing for a Radio Station, be sure to give the correct pronounciations.
- 4. In announcing an event give at least one week. If reporting an event send the news in as soon as possible.

Another one said, "Yeah, that's for old men, somethin! like checkers---

a good way to kill time."

Frank was dragging his feet, but I rode out to do battle with the "Dragon". I don't know who manufactures these horrible things, but I believe they are mostly paper-mache! with seegar smoke and sound effects furnished by our own men. First, I softened it up by asking the innocent question, "Do you think 'working-out' in a gymnasium is a waste of time? How about track meets? Basketball? Football?"

The answer was negative, so I pulle the rug, revealing the trap coor, "You see, chess is the 'gymnasium' for the mind, and chess tournaments are the 'track meets'. Chess matches are the 'ball games'."

The Dragon whined, "But there's a lot of brainwork in ball games."

Showing no mercy, I opened the trapdoor in front of the Dragon, "Yes, but on an entirely different level. You see, the physical games require mental activity mainly on the reflex-action level, whereas chess is designed to test the highest functions of the mind."


