

V. PUPOLS WINS IN TACOMA

VIKTORS PUPOLS, scoring 6-1, won the City of Tacoma Chess Champion-ship in a seven round Swiss held recently. The new champion won five in a row and then drew his last two games to take undisputed first place.

LESLIE COUBROUGH was a sensation in this tourney. He lost his first game by default and then won four straight, drew with Pupols, and finished up with a win over HEWITT to score $5\frac{1}{2}-1\frac{1}{2}$, only $\frac{1}{2}$ point out of first place.

VERNON HOIMES, who practically always wins the Tacoma Championship, had to be content with third place this time. He lost to Pupols and Hewitt and won the others for a 5-2 record.

Highlights of the tournament as supplied by RCBERT COLLINS, Tournament Director: Coubrough's showing; RONALD LOUGHEED, Lincoln High School student, with his good play against tough competition; HEWITT upsetting HOIMES; and HULTMAN drawing with PUPOLS.

The Tourney Director used a numbered card for each player. The numbers were used to determine the pairings and colors. Odd numbers had white in the first round, lowest number had white in following rounds. In the pairings, the lowest number of equal scores were paired first with the next lowest number following, etc.

The last game of HAMILTON and FINNIGAN should not have been played. HAMILTON should have had a bye, but FINNIGAN being there, the T. D. had them play together. The reason they shouldn't have played is any player forfeiting two games was considered eliminated from the tourney. FINNIGAN, former editor of the Chess Letter, had forfeited twice prior to his final round encounter with HAMILTON.

As there were no prizes, just the title, and first and second places were not tied, there did not seem to be any reason for the Median, Solkoff or S-B. tie-breaking systems being used.

PUGET SOUND Vode LEAGUE

Round Two Pugot Sound League action on November 13th did not go according to schedule. The Seattle Chess Club team composed of GEORGE BISHOP, DAN WADE, KEN MULFORD, ALAN MCGREGOR and WILLIAM GILLETTE, arrived at the boat landing for the trip to McNcil Island about one minute too late. The boat was pulling out just as the travelers drove down to the dock. A phone call to the island did no good and since the next boat wouldn't be back until two hours later, the match was canceled. This has been an unhappy year for the Seattle Chess Club in the Puget Sound League. The team showed up for their first match only to have their first opponent drop out of the League without notice. Twice the team has expended time and energy to help make the League a success and twice the reward for their efforts has been zero.

Boeings visited the University of Washington and that match did not go according to plan either. Two men on each team failed to show up for the match so only three played on a side with Boeings coming out on top $3\frac{1}{2}$ to $2\frac{1}{2}$. We are informed that no arrangement was agreed upon for further play by either side so apparently $3\frac{1}{2}$ to $2\frac{1}{2}$ is the final score. BILIS and DR. MICHAEL broke even on first board, VELLIAS and PUPOIS, representing the Boeing Club and the University respectively, did not put in an appearance for games on the second board. MAX BADER split 1-1 with ALAN CLARK of the U. on third board while FRANK RODNITE defeated OLIVER LAFRENIERE $1\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$ to give Boeings (formerly the Scattle Y M C A) their one-point margin of victory.

The only complete match played in round two was between Kitsap and Tacoma. The visiting Kitsap team won that one by the tight score of $5\frac{1}{2}$ to $4\frac{1}{2}$ with Dr. Almond's $1\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$ decision over VIC HULTMAN on second board deciding the issue. All other boards broke even. CHARLES MAGERKURTH on third board for Kitsap played two draws with LESLIE COUBROUGH. He played two draws with MAX BADER of Boeings in his first round match so now MAGERKURTH has played four League games and drawn them all. Do we have a new "Drawing Master" in our midst?

Third round Puget Sound League play on Sunday, Nov. 27th again proved disappointing. The Scattle Chess Club versus West Scattle match was another of those three board affairs because West Scattle's first board man and Scattle's fourth board man failed to show up for the match. The Editor was informed that the Scattle team would number six because of an over energetic recruiting drive so he took himself off the team for the match so work could be done on this issue of the Washington Chess Letter. However, only four showed up and even this was botched up as Noland should have faced Ben Weischer on first board, Bishop vs. Mage on second board, Mulford vs. Seekamp on third board, Erickson vs. Howard on fourth and the easily available McGregor could have filled in for two forfeit wins on fifth board. Scattle would probably have won by a wide margin. Instead Noland received 2 points by forfeit on first board for Soattle while Seckamp received 2 forfeits on fourth board making it 2-2. Erickson won $1\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$ from Howard of West Seattle but both Bishop and Mulford were upset by West Seattle's Weischer and Mage respectively to give West Scattle a very close 50 to 40 victory. Yes, the Scattle Choss Club was sabotaged.

Boeings led Tacoma 5 to 3 but the visitors from the City of Dostiny, 2 points in arrears with only 2 left to play, did not roll over and die! They won the last two games to earn a 5 to 5 tie. Max Bader defeated Hultman 2-0 but Jerry Hanson of Tacoma blanked Carl Hanson of Boeings. Since all of the other boards broke even, the match was a tie.

The University of Washington had been scheduled to visit Bremerton to play Kitsap but, because of the Thanksgiving holiday, the match was post - poned one week. If the result is in before we go to press, it will be included elsewhere in this issue. SEE PAGE SEVEN.










WHAT WOULD YOU DO?

The position pictured is from an actual game in which White thought he had a winning advantage, --but made a weak move, and went on to lose the game. It is presented with the idea of starting a new feature in Washington Chess Letter, a round-table to which the readers may send positions from over-the-board or finished postal games where they reached a point from which they didn't know how

to proceed, in order to get ideas from other readers. You are invited to comment on this position, and to send in positions for discussion.

State what move you would make and indicate for what purpose. Consider that your opponent is of equal strength. 




Some of the above are new entries, and as is the case for about 15 solvers awarded lesser points for imperfect solutions they are slightly off the pace, just waiting for the leaders to falter

THE CORRECT SOLUTION is forcing all the way, and it goes like this:

1. R-N8ch
2. K-R2 R-KR8ch
3. KxR N-N6ch
4. PxN (or lose Q) QxPch
5. KxQ STALEMATE

Several of the stronger players became a little careless after finding the key move. Thus, if as above to Black's 3rd, and Black plays Q-N8ch, or Q-B8ch., White plays his bishop to Q1, the zugswang is released and B lack can now move his knight pawn. And of course 3. ..Q-Q8ch; 4. BxQ, also releases the pawn. Forcing a rook trade is not good because White's extra pawns would win.

A waste of time. The attack on K B7 via KB3 is obvious and promature. 5 0-0 or P-Q3 mobilizes more rapidly.

5. ... N-B3 6. P-K5 P-Q4

7. B-N3

Certainly not 7. PxN, PxB; 8. Q-K2ch., B-K3; (if 8. PxP, BxP and Black has two magnificent Bishops and an open file or 8. O-O, QxP with a strong center and attacking chances.) White is now cramped considerably. 7. B-K2 seems more promising in view of events to come (and with remarkable hindsight)

7. ... B-KN5 8. P-KB3 N-K5!

Immuno and threatening 9....Q-R5 ch.; 10 P-N3 (if K-B1?, mate of course) NxNP and White can resign.

9. 0-0

"Into the jaws of death", P-KN3 would save some serious problems temporarily, at least.

9. ... P-Q61

Threatening, not to win the exchange with 10....B-B4ch., (for White wins the Queen Bishop), but, among other things, 10....B-B4ch.; 11 K-R1, Q-R51; and the Knight check at N6 is devastating, with or without 12 P-KN3. 10 PxB

Removing some of the weed, but not the main threat.

10 B-B4ch. 11 K-R1 N-N6ch.!!

And it still works!
12 PxN Q-N4

Again harping on that mate thome:

The only defense.

Brilliancy upon maddoning brill - iancy! If 14 RxQ, PxP dis. ch.; 15 R-R5, RxR mate.

Proventing White's Queen from protecting R4 with Q-K1.
