

Several Months Earlier

Immediately following the Oct 1987 mail ballot election, after stepping down as the editor of NWC I again became the WCF TD after several years' break. I knew that it would be my responsibility to find a site for the annual, eight-player, round robin championship, traditionally held on two consecutive weekends in late January or early February.

Prospects were not good for this year. Seattle Chess Club no longer met at the Senior Citizens Center so that was out; their new location did not have the lighting or amenities and would probably carry a rental fee. The intended plan (conceived in mid-1987) to hold the second weekend of the championship inside the "glass room" at the Seattle Skating Club's Bingo Hall in conjunction with a major regional tournament (thus providing between 75-100 spectators) fell through when two open tournaments held there in Apr 87 and Oct 87 each lost \$300-\$600 (depending on what you included in the expenses and your time being worth nothing), and noting that the Christmas Congress/Challengers Cup held there in Dec 87 barely broke even. Therefore, as the major backer who stood to lose the most, I reluctantly cancelled the proposed Feb 88 open tournament, and with that went the planned site for the Closed.

The public libraries used in the past are not quite so accessible as before, especially on TWO CONSECUTIVE weekends. Too, tournament control is affected when you are not allowed into the site itself until a certain time and (worse, at least as far as chess is concerned!), you must vacate by a certain time - thus forcing an adjournment of games that might otherwise be played out.

I mention the above only so that the Washington Chess Federation members can realize that the selection of a site is not capricious, but is based on a number of factors, some of which are economic.

Time was growing short! Until the WCF officers' meeting was held authorizing the funds for prizes and expenses and until I could obtain a firm site, no announcement could be made in NORTHWEST CHESS.

In 1987, the WCF paid a modest rental fee for the site. In 1988, Pioneer West Bookshop of West Seattle (Russell Miller, owner) offered to DONATE the site, add \$50 to the prize fund and another \$25 to help cover expenses. This on top of the \$500 prize fund and \$200 expense budget voted by the WCF. So \$50 could be the 4th prize. Money is not everything (unless you don't have it!), but I did visit the proposed site to check space (small), seating, lighting (good) and amenities (refreshments available right outside the front door at several commercial restaurants down the main business street, which would not be similarly convenient at either of the two libraries, but which had otherwise been very good sites in the past!). Not much room for spectators, but looking at it overall and that (to my knowledge) the tournament had never been held in West Seattle, I accepted the Pioneer West Bookshop offer on behalf of the WCF.

Inviting the Players

With the Pioneer West offer in hand, and prize money and expenses authorized by the WCF, I needed only the USCF annual rating list to proceed. Upon receipt of it, I immediately key-punched in the updated ratings for masters and experts into my computerized 3,000-plus chessplayer database and then sorted out a list of names and addresses in rating order for Washington state residents: 1 Grandmaster, 2 International Masters, 1 Senior Master (2400 plus), 5 Masters (range 2300-2399), 14 Masters (range 2200-2299), 14 Experts (range 2100-2199), and 22 Experts (range 2000-2099).

I then mailed to all 59 an information sheet listing the above players, their ratings, and furnishing some details of the tournament. When everything seemed firm, I again mailed a post-card to the players, asking them to confirm their intent to enter, and also stating that only the TOP FIVE would be invited based on ratings, and that THREE were seeded: the 1987 defending champion and the runner-up and one from the 1987 Challengers Cup for a total of eight.

It was NOT "first come" but rather "highest rated". Even if you had already confirmed, you could be displaced by a higher rated entry. And this in fact happened; up until the night before the tournament we had one seeded and one highly rated player not yet confirmed with Charles Jones and Paul Eggers on standby. When Viktors Pupols and Bobby Ferguson entered, Jones and Eggers were out.

I have been asked why not set a deadline for confirmation? I answered that some years before, I had set a deadline (about ten days' prior) but, at the players' meeting, the late entries got in anyway because the WCF Bylaws state that the "top rated" players are eligible and those Bylaws do not give the TD any discretion to set an earlier deadline for confirmation. What is "logical" is not always legal! Perhaps this could be resolved in the future.

Interest was very high and, as it turned out, seven of the top eight came from the top fifteen on my original list, very possibly one of the most experienced and most highly rated fields for this event:

- 2327 Magdy Admin Assem (Graduate Math Student from Egypt)
- 2315 Bobby Ferguson (Champion 1984, 1987)

- 2271 John Braley (Champion 1971, 1983, Co-Champion 1986)
- 2259 Matthew B. Edwards (Co-Champion 1986)
- 2249 Clark R. Harmon (many times Oregon Champion)
- 2059 David C. Roper (seeded)

Players Meeting

We met at 10 am on Saturday, February 6th. It was very calm and agreeable, compared to the 1970's when there would be "discussions" about who got to play. Should such a problem come up, however, it would be resolved by a vote of the WCF officers who are present - and it does not matter whether they are or might be in the tournament. Once the officers decide, the elected TD takes over and manages the event.

The main discussion this year was on the time control. I learned that the 1986 tournament had 50/2 with a five hour maximum session which led to numerous adjournments, which we wanted to avoid or at least reduce to a minimum. We agreed on 40 moves in two hours, then 20 in one with adjournment after six hours of play. [In fact, this year's event produced only one adjournment.]

I also announced that we would adopt the 100-move draw rule for those positions given on page 15 of the USCF OFFICIAL RULES OF CHESS (Tim Redman, 1987).

We had a blank crosstable sheet with the pairings already made; it remained only for the players to draw by lot - a blank envelope with a numbered card (1-8) inside. Perhaps symbolically, Matt Edwards drew number 1.



SEVEN GAMES ON THE ROAD TO THE TITLE annotated by Matthew Edwards, 1988 WA State Champion

A 07 King's Indian Attack
VICTORS PUPOLS - MATTHEW EDWARDS
Round 1

1.Nf3 d5 2.g3 Nf6 3.Bg2 Nbd7 4.d3 e5 5.0-0 Bd6 6.Nbd2 0-0 7.e4 dxe4. Also possible is c6, maintaining the tension in the center. I chose 7...dxe4 because it restricts the activity of White's light squared bishop. 8.Nxe4 Nxe4 9.dxe4 Nf6?! The knight is not well placed on f6. It threatens nothing and prevents Black from supporting e5 with a pawn. 9...Nc5, forestalling 10.Qd3, must be better. 10.Qd3 Qe7 11.b3 Rd8 12.Bb2 Be6. With Be6, Black completes the development and prepares to solidify the center. I believe White now intended to prepare f4, but never had quite enough time to play it. 13.Rad1 Nd7 14.h3 f6 15.Qe2 Ba3. Attacking White's queenside weaknesses. 16.Ba1 a5 17.Nd2 a4 18.Nc4 Bc5 19.Kh2 axb3 20.axb3 Ra2. If now 21.f4? then 21...b5 22.Nb2 Bd4 23.Rb1 Qa3. 21.Bc3 Rda8. Threatening b5. 22.Ra1 Rxa1 23.Bxa1? Ra2. Still threatening b5, but now it is very hard to meet, e.g. 24.Bc3 b5 25.Nb2 b4. 24.Qd3 Bxf2 25.Bxe5 Nxe5 26.Nxe5 Bxg3 27.Qxg3 fxe5 28.Rf2. If 28.Qxe5, then 28...Rxc2 threatening 29...Rxc2. Time pressure now sets in. 28...Qc5 29.Qh4 Ra8 30.Bf1 Rf8 31.Rxf8 Qxf8 32.Kg2 Qf6 33.Qe1 h6 34.Qc3 Qf4 35.Qd3. If 35.Qxc7 Bxh3, and in addition to the h-pawn Black will acquire the pawn on e4, which should assure an easy victory. 35...Kh7 36.Be2 Qg5 37.Kh2 Qf4 38.Kg2 Qg5 39.Kh2 Qf6 40.Kg2 Qe7 41.Qg3 Qc5 42.Bd3 Qd6 43.Qf3 Bg8?! 44.Qf5. I had assumed this move impossible on account of 44...Qg5. However, after 45.Kf3 Qxf5 46.exf5 Bd5 47.Be4 c6 48.c4 Bf7 49.Bc2, White picks up the e-pawn. 44...g6 45.Qc8 b6 46.h4?! This seriously weakens White's kingside. 46...Be6 47.Qe8 Qd7 48.Qf8 Qf7. After the exchange of Queens, I naturally assumed Black would win easily. However, as Vic pointed out in the post-mortem, the win is not so clear. White's king sits on g3, blockading the kingside. White puts his pawn on b4, and it and his bishop cover the squares on the queenside. How does Black's King get in without trading an excessive amount of material? After the move played, White loses a second pawn. 49.Qb4? Bg4 50.Bc4 Qf3 51.Kg1 Qe3 52.Kg2 Qxe4 53.Kf2 Qf3 54.Kg1 Qd1 55.Kf2 Qf3 56.Kg1 Qd1 57.Kf2 Qd6 58.Qa4 Be6 59.Qe8!? Played just before the second time control. This permits Black to weaken White's pawns, but White's Queen gets an excellent post on e8 from which it is exceedingly difficult to dislodge. 59...Bxc4 60.bxc4 Qf6 61.Ke2 Kg7 62.Kd3 Qd6 63.Ke2 h5. The plan was eventually Qf6,

Kh6 and to win the h-pawn. However, Vic now permits an exchange down to a won King and pawn ending. 64.Kf3 Qf8 65.Qxf8 Kxf8 66.Ke4 Kf7 67.Kxe5 g5 68.hxg5 Kg6 69.Kf4 c6.



70.c5 b5. Of course not 70...bxc5? 71.c4 with a draw. Now Black will win the advanced c-pawn after the g and h pawns are exchanged. 71.c3 h4 72.Kg4 h3 73.Kxh3 Kxg5 74.Kg3 Kf5 75.Kf3 Ke5 76.Ke3 Kd5 77.Kd3 Kxc5 78.Kc2 Kc4 79.Kb2 Kd3 80.Kb3 c5. 0 : 1

B 80 Sicilian Defense
MATTHEW EDWARDS - DAVE ROPER
Round 2

1.e4 c5 2.Nf3 e6 3.d4 cxd4 4.Nxd4 Nc6 5.Nc3 a6 6.g3 d6 7.Bg2 Qc7 8.0-0 Nf6 9.b3 This double fianchetto system is slow, but not without positional justification. In "normal" lines, White's dark squared Bishop can give him trouble. On e3, for example, it can be attacked by a Knight on either g4 or c4. On b2, however, it pressures the center and creates latent threats against the Black King. Also, the pawn on b3 denies Black the maneuver Ne5-c4, and prepares an eventual c4 by White. If Black fails to respond aggressively, as in this game, he may simply find himself being squeezed to death. 9...Be7 10.Bb2 0-0 11.Nce2 Rb8. Black is playing for the break b5, but never manages to achieve it. 12.c4 Ne5?! The Knight maneuver initiated by this move simply wastes too much time. He needs to prepare b5 by playing 12...Bd7. 13.Qd2 Ned7 14.Nc3 Nc5 15.f4 Re8? The Rook performs no purpose on e8. Moreover, it deprives Black's Knight on f6 of a useful retreat square. Black's f7 square may also become weak. Again 15...Bd7 was called for. 16.Rad1 Bd7. To late! 17.Qe2. Threat 18.e5. 17...Bc6? This move loses a piece, but White's position is substantially superior in any case. 18.b4 e5. If 18...Ncd7, then 19.b5 winning the Bishop. If 18...Na4, then 19.Nxc6 Nxc3 20.Nxe7. 19.Nxc6 bxc6 20.bxc5. 1 : 0



D 25 Queen's Gambit Accepted
CLARK HARMON - MATTHEW EDWARDS
Round 3


1.d4 d5 2.c4 dxc4. I knew that Clark likes to play exchange variations of the QGD. Hence, the Queen's Gambit Accepted. I hoped we would both be on relatively unfamiliar territory. 3.Nf3 Nf6 4.e3 Bg4 5.Bxc4 e6 6.O-O a6 7.Nc3 Nc6 8.Be2 Bd6. Black aims to free his game with e5. 9.h3 Bh5 10.Qc2!? White deviates from theory with this move, which prepares Rd1 and looks toward an eventual e4. However, the Queen on c2 will be subject to attack by Black's minor pieces, and e4 turns out not to be so strong. 10...O-O 11.a3 Qe7 12.Rd1 Rfd8 13.b4?! White expands on the queenside, and prepares Bb2. White's queenside pawns turn out to be weak. 13...Bg6 14.e4? White's center advances, only to be undermined. 14...e5! 15.d5 Nd4. Clark explained after the game that he had overlooked this move. 16.Qd3. White cannot take the Knight. If 16.Nxd4 exd4 17.Rxd4, then 17...Qe5 threatens both mate and the Rook. 16...a5. Black continues to undermine White's position. 17.bxa5 Nb3? But this maneuver is not the best. The simple 17...Rxa5 threatens the a and d-pawns. 18.Ra2. If 18.Rb1, then 18...Nc5 followed by 19...Nfxe4, and Black gains an important tempo on account of the threat to the Rook. 18...Nxc1. I considered 18...Nc5, but rejected it as on 19.Qb5 Nfxe4 20.Nxe4 Bxe4 21.Be3 White seemed to stand OK. The text eliminates White's good Bishop and pressures White's a-pawn. 19.Rxc1 Rxa5 20.Nh4!? White jettisons the a-pawn in order to rid himself of Black's pressure on e4. However, after 20.a4 Bb4 Black does not really threaten to take the e-pawn because of the counterthreats to Black's e and c-pawns. 20...Rxa3 21.Nxg6 hxg6 22.Rxa3 Bxa3 23.Rb1 c6. After 23...b6 Black's light square weaknesses probably adequately compensate White for the pawn deficit. 24.Qc4 cxd5 25.exd5. Considering White's subsequent move, 25.Nxd5 is probably better. 25...Bc5 26.Ne4 Nxe4 27.Nxe4 b6. Black, in time-trouble, is looking for "safe" moves to solidify his position. 28.Rb3. With the idea of transfer to the g or h files to attack Black's King. Perhaps Ra1 is better. 28...Ra8 29.g4 Ra3. Trading pieces in time-trouble. 30.Rxa3 Bxa3 31.Bc4 Bc5 32.Kg2 Bd4 33.Qf3 Qd6 34.h4 Kf8. 1/2 : 1/2. Having almost played 34...Qc5, which would lose to 35.d6, I offered a draw and was relieved when Clark accepted.

B 16 Caro-Kann Defense
MATTHEW EDWARDS - BOBBY FERGUSON
Round 4

1.e4 c6 2.d4 d5 3.Nc3 dxe4 4.Nxe4 Nf6 5.Nxf6 gxf6 6.c3. White delays developing his king Knight until after Black has committed his queen Bishop. 6...Bf5 7.Nf3 e6 8.g3 Bd6 9.Bg2 Qc7 10.Nh4 Bg6 11.f4. White threatens f5, followed by O-O and Bf4, destroying Black's kingside pawn structure and entombing Black's dark squared Bishop. Black's reply is therefore forced. 11...f5 12.Qe2 Be7. Forces White to make a decision about his Knight. If White permits Black to capture, e.g. by 13.Bd2, then Black will reactivate his light squared Bishop: 13...Bxh4 14.gxh4 Qe7 15.Qf2 (If 15.h5 Qh4 followed by Bh5) Bh5. Therefore, White must liquidate opponent's problem Bishop. Black's resulting kingside pawn formation is actually quite solid, and White gets a pesky weakness on h2. 13.Nxg6 hxg6 14.Bd2 Nd7 15.O-O-O Nf6?! As it turns out, Black's knight maneuvers are too slow. Black should consider 15...O-O-O followed by 16...c5, challenging White's center more aggressively. 16.c4. Denying the Knight the d5 square. Since 16...Ng4 is met by Bf3, Black's Knight is no better off on f6 than d7. 16...O-O-O 17.Bc3 Rhe8. Still too slow. Black's Rook is no better placed on e8 than on h8. Indeed, this Rook becomes the object of attack. 18.Kb1 Ng8 (diagram) Is Black simply lost after this move? I don't see where he can improve later. 19.Qc2! Since Black has failed to pressure the center, White is now able to unleash a very powerful queenside attack. 19...Bf6 20.Qa4. Threatens both 21.Qxa7 and 21.Ba5. 20...Qb8 21.Ba5! Rxd4. If 21...c6, then 22.Bxc6. 22.Bxc6. Simple, but effective. White begins removing the pawns protecting Black's King. If 22...bxc6, the 23.Qxc6 with mate. 22...Re7. Forced. If 22...Rf8, then 23.Bd7 with mate. 23.Bf3 Red7 24.Rxd4 Bxd4. If 24...Rxd4, then 25.Qe8 wins.



After 18...Ng8



After 24...Bxd4.

25.c5! Threatening c6, utterly denuding the Black King. Also, the White Queen now attacks the Bishop on d4 - see note to Black's next move. 25...Bxc5. If 25...Ne7 26.Rd1 e5 (forced) 27.fxe5 Qxe5 28.Bc3 and White wins the Bishop. 26.Rc1 Qd6. Or 26...b6 27.Rxc5 bxc5

28.Qc6 Rc7 29.Qe8 mate. 27.Rd1 Qe7 28.Rxd7.
1 : 0 If 28...Qxd7 then 29.Bb7 wins the Queen.

Grunfeld Defense

NEIL SALMON - MATTHEW EDWARDS

Round 5

1.Nf3 Nf6 2.g3 d5 3.Bg2 g6 4.O-O Bg7 5.d4 O-O
6.c4 dxc4 7.Na3 c6 8.Nxc4 Be6. Black plans to
post this Bishop on d5, contesting control over the e4
square. However, he has only pieces covering this
square, while White might be able to attack e4 with his
f-pawn. 9.Nce5 Bd5 10.e3?! With this move, White
both gives up the struggle over e4 and locks in his dark
squared Bishop. Therefore, 9.Nfe5 must have been better.
If then 11...Bd5, White avoids the exchange of Bishops
and prepares e4 by 12.f3. It is hard to see how Black
would contest White's control of the center. Now Black
seizes the initiative. 10...Nbd7 11.Bh3 Nxe5
12.Nxe5 Ne4 13.f3 Ng5 14.Bg2 Bxe5 15.dxe5.
Black has a good queenside pawn majority against White's
crippled kingside pawns. This ought to have been a
winning advantage. 15...Bc4 16.Qxd8 Rfxd8 17.Re1
Ba6. This Bishop would have been forced to move
anyway. The plan is to begin mobilizing the queenside
pawns and also hopefully to neutralize the White Bishop
that will soon occupy a3. 18.b3 Ne6 19.Ba3 c5
20.Rad1 b6 21.f4 Rxd1 22.Rxd1 Rd8 23.Rxd8
Nxd8 24.Kf2 Kf8 25.Ke1 Ke8 26.Kd2 Kd7 27.b4
cxb4 28.Bxb4 Bb7 29.Bh3 e6 30.Bf1 a5 31.Bd6
Bc6 32.Bf8 Nb7 33.Kc3 Ke8 34.Bg7 Nc5 35.Be2
Kd7 36.Bf8 Ne4 37.Kc4 Nd2? A time-pressure
inaccuracy. Correct is 37...Bd5 38.Kd4 Kc6, retaining
good winning chances. Now White trades down to a drawn
opposite colored bishop ending. 38.Kc3 Nf3 39.Bxf3
Bxf3 40.Kd4 Kc6 41.Be7 Kd7 42.Bf8 Bd5 43.a3
Bf3 44.Kc4 Be2 45.Kd4 Bf1 46.g4. After this
move, it is clear that White will be able to cover all his
kingside weaknesses with the Bishop, so the game is dead
draw. Mere inertia keeps it going for another ten moves.
46...h5 47.gxh5 gxh5 48.h4 Be2 49.Kc3 Kc6
50.Be7 b5 51.Bd8 b4 52.axb4 a4 53.Be7 Kb5
54.Bc5. 1/2 : 1/2

Modern Defense

MATTHEW EDWARDS - JOHN BRALEY

Round 6

Notes by Edwards (E) and Braley (B)

1.e4 d6 2.d4 g6 3.Nf3 Bg7.

(E): In many of our previous contests I had adopted a
setup in which White develops his light squared Bishop to
d3. John had played the opening moves confidently, so...
4.Bc4 c6 5.O-O d5 6.exd5 cxd5 7.Bb5 Bd7
8.Nc3?!

(E): This Knight is misplaced on c3.

8...Nf6 9.Re1 O-O 10.Qe2.

(E): The White Queen now obstructs the relocation of the
c3 Knight. Perhaps the immediate 10.Ne5 is better.
10...Re8.

(B): Here I was wishing I had earlier exchanged on b5, so
I could play 10...e6 without fear of locking in the Bishop
on d7 (i.e. 10...e6 11.Bd3). The exchange is not now
feasible as after 10...Bxb5 11.Qxb5 a pawn (b, d, or e)
would fall.

11.Ne5 a6.


(B): I didn't play 11...Nc6 because my Knight is more
valuable than his b5 Bishop in the fight for the dark
squares. Look at this: 11...Nc6 12.Bxc6 bxc6 13.Na4;
White applies his Knights like vice-grips. Of course,
12...Bxc6 is more sensible. White would not be so foolish
as to reply 13.Nxc6 bxc6 14.Na4 because 14...Nd7 wins
the center with a coming e5, but White permit the Bishop
to remain on c6, looking something like a big pawn.
12.Bxd7.

(B): Now the Bishop retreat is not so appetizing. For
example: 12.Bd3 Nc6 13.Nxc6 bxc6 14.Na4 (better is the
quiet 14.Be3) a5 15.b3 e5 16.dxe5 Ng4 17.f4 Bxe5
18.fxe5 Rxe5 19.Bd2 Qc7 with too many threats against
the King and Queen. The idea is that White would no longer
have the luxury of Na4 because Black's lead in
development permits an explosion in the center.
12...Nxd7 13.Bg5 b5?

(E): Overlooking the weakness of the c6 square. Better
is the simple 13...Rc8.

(B): Were it White's move he would play 14.Qf3
threatening the d pawn. Since 14...e6 would then lose a
piece to 15.Nxd7, Black would cover with the Knight,
14...Nb6, then worry about what to do after 15.a4
threatening to boot the critter. Naturally I was pleased to
be able to protect b6 against pests before moving in. In
long range terms the position calls for a queenside
minority attack and ...b5 is a big part of that plan. But the
move is a simple oversight! Black surrenders a pawn.
Fortunately for me Matt thought I was sacrificing to trap
his Knight and took 23 minutes before grabbing.

14.Nc6 Qb6 15.Nxe7 Kf8.



16.Bxf6?

(E): On my 14th move, I had envisioned the position that
actually occurred after White's 23rd move, and
erroneously decided that White stood better. Accordingly,
I was playing these moves quickly, without searching for

improvements. As John pointed out immediately after the game, much better for White is simply 16.Qf3, as the Knight on e7 is invulnerable due the eventual fork of King and Queen on d5.


(B): What a pleasant surprise! I was sure Matt had worked out 16.Qf3 Rxe7 17.Rxe7 Kxe7 17.Nxd5 - devastation! The idea of the text is to draw the Knight on d7 away from the defense of its Queen so the White Knights can take on d5. 16.Qf3 would have accomplished the same purpose by stepping out of the pin while preserving White's dangerous dark-square Bishop. But Matt wasn't loafing. At this point he had calculated to the 23rd move, thinking he would be wiping out my Queenside pawns.

16...Nxf6 17.Nexd5 Nxd5 18.Nxd5 Qxd4.

(B): Of course not 18...Rxe2 19.Nxb6 although I had put a fair amount of thought into it, trying to see if I could corral the Knight on b6. (In the trade that's called a "fantasy variation".)

19.Qf3 Qxb2 20.Nc7 Rxe1 21.Rxe1 Rc8 22.Qb7.

(B): I feared 22.Qc6 with the threats of Ne6 and R/Qe8, but 22...Kg8 defends. 22...Rd8 23.Qxa6.



(E): This was the position I had forseen. I thought that the threat of 24.Qd6 meant that White would pick up the pawn on b5, so that White ultimately winds up with the only pawn on the queenside. Unfortunately, this calculation was erroneous.

(B): Looks like it's turning into a laughter for White. My b pawn is in take, but the real joke is 24.Qd6!. I wanted to riposte with 23...Qe5, but the punchline would have been 24.Qa5! and White wins. I settled for a nice quiet sally that opens a breathing space for my King, invites the opposing Rook to go home and prepares extra defence for the b pawn.

23...Bc3 24.Rf1 b4.

(E): Now White's pieces are misplaced, and he is hard-pressed to defend.

25.Nd5.

(E): Centralizing the Knight, and preventing Black's Rook from penetrating to the second rank. Of course, on 25...Rxd5? 26.Qa8 picks up the Rook. Time pressure is setting in.

(B): Matt didn't want to drop back and defend. He felt the incursion of the Rook at d2 (after the precautionary 25...Kg7) would prove decisive.

25...Qxc2 26.g3 Kg7 27.Qc4?

(E): This permits Black to attack the a-pawn with the Rook on a8. Better is 27.Qa5 Rb8 28.a3, liquidating the queenside pawns.

27...Qd2 28.Ne3 Ra8 29.Rd1 Qxa2 30.Qf4.

(E): Threatening a perpetual after 31.Nf5 gxf5 32.Qg5 Kf8 33.Rd8.

30...Ra5 31.Ng4 Rd5 32.Qh6 Kg8 33.Rxd5.

(E): 33.Re1 is a better try. Of course, if 33...Bxe1, then 34.Nf6 wins. After 33...Rd8 34.Qg5 Black must be careful, e.g. 34...Qd5 35.Re8 winning. But 34...Qd2 holds everything. Now White is forced into a lost minor piece ending.

33...Qxd5 34.Qc1 Qd2 35.Qb1 Qe1 36.Qxe1 Bxe1 37.Ne3 b3 38.Nc4 Bb4 39.Kf1 Kg7 40.Ke2 Kf6.

(B): Obviously the last many moves have been made in extreme time pressure. The extra pawn is probably sufficient. At any rate the game is quickly decided.

41.Kd3 Bc5 42.Nd2 b2 43.Kc3 Bxf2 44.Kxb2 Kf5 45.Kc2 Kg4 46.Ne4 Bg1 47.Nf6 Kf5 48.Ng8 Bxh2 49.g4 Kg5.

(E): If 49...Kxg4, then 50.Nh6 followed by 51.Nxf7, and White still has faint hopes of sacrificing his Knight for the g-pawn, securing the draw. Now Black is simply going to trap White's Knight. Resignation now would not have been inappropriate.

(B): Although Matt lost this game, the depth of his calculation referred to on move 16 shows just how sharply he was playing. And what an exciting last round this loss set up!





Also possible is a speculative piece sacrifice with 5...Bc5. After 5...Ne7, the game Edwards- Mulford, 1980 continued 6.Nxe5 d6? 7.Bb5 c6 8.dxc6 Qb6 9.cxb7 Kd8 10.Nxf7 Kc7 11.bxa8=N! 1 : 0. 6.Nxe5 Qf6?! I was sure Magdy was going to play 6...Qe7, which leads to a drawish position after 7.Qd4 d6 8.Qxe4 Qxe5 9.Bd3 Qxe4 10.Bxe4. Also possible is 6...Bc5. Magdy's move was new to me. 7.Ng4. I almost played 7.Qd4, which leads to the loss of a pawn after 7...Nxf2! 7...Qe7. As it obstructs the development of the f8 Bishop, this cannot be good. 8.Be2 f5?! 9.0-0! The open e-file begins to dominate the position. Black's Knight, Queen and King are all lined up, waiting to be attacked. If now 9...fxg4, then 10.Bd3, recovering the piece with advantage. 9...h5? 10.Ne3 Qf6?



11.Nxf5! Again, the open e-file menaces Black. **11...Qxf5 12.Bd3 Be7 13.Re1 Qxd5 14.Rxe4?!** After the game, John Braley suggested 14.c4! If Black retreats 14...Qf7, then White can capture 15.Bxe4. Black is forced to play 15...Kd8 (else White will win with 16.Bg5!), and after 16.Nc3 c6 17.Qd3 White is clearly on top. Therefore, Black must defend his g5 square with 14...Qa5, but after 15.Nc3 Nc6 (on 15...0-0 16.Bd5 is crushing) 16.Nd5 Kd8 17.Bd2 White again is winning. **14...Nc6 15.Qe2 Kd8!** The only move, lifting the pin on the e7 Bishop. If 15...d6, then 16.Bb5 Qf7 17.Bg5 wins. **16.c4 Qf7 17.Nc3 d6 18.Nd5 Bf5?**



Fatal. After 18...Bf6 White's battery of heavy pieces on the e-file threatens nothing concrete. Moreover, White's Rook on e4 is subject to attack. After 19.Nxf6 gxf6 (19...Qxf6 20.Bd2) 20.Bf4 Bf5 21.Re3 Bxd3 22.Qxd3 Ne5 Black is still alive. Now, though, he loses material. **19.Rxe7 Nxe7 20.Bg5 Re8 21.Qf3.** Avoiding possible pin on the e-file and heading for an ending with two minor pieces for a Rook. **21...Be6 22.Qxf7 Bxf7 23.Nxe7 Kd7 24.Bf5 Be6 25.Bxe6 Kxe6 26.Nd5 Kd7 27.Kf1 Re4 28.b3 Rae8 29.Be3 b6 30.Re1 c6.** Black has weakened his queenside pawns, making White's task much easier. At this point both players were in mild time trouble. **31.Nc3 R4e5 32.Bd2 Ke6 33.Rxe5 Kxe5 34.Be3 Kf5 35.Ke2 g5 36.Kd3 h4 37.Ne2 c5 38.Nc3 g4 39.Nb5 Ke5 40.Nc3 a6?** Black errs on the last move of time control. 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
THE MOST FAMOUS "TYPICAL" COMBINATION

"Every experienced chessplayer knows, that all (or almost all) combinations arise out of a remembrance of some known tactical pattern" - Richard Reti. This means that most of the combinations must be learned as an idea and as a typical situation where this tactical idea can be executed. Let me introduce you to the most famous typical combination, first played by Lasker just 99 years ago!

The Portland Chess Club

by Michael A. Powe

The Portland Chess Club aspires to become the chess center of Portland. Its two guardian Rooks boldly proclaim the building's purpose; the six-foot turrets promise to become neighborhood landmarks, pharoses signalling safe harbor to the chess community.



Since the institution of a non-smoking policy and the remodelling of its interior, the Portland Chess Club has been attracting new members, and demonstrating in the process that the concept of a chess club owned and operated by its members is a viable one. Two new Life Members have contributed \$1000 apiece to the club, bringing the total number of such contributions to

fifteen. At the club's annual meeting, held on January 26, President Milt Colpron was able to announce that these developments, coupled with strong support from regular members and an influx of new members, enabled the Board of Directors to make a substantial early payment on its outstanding debt.

The club plunged into an expanded program of expanded activities with a Portland high school championship tournament on February 6. Thirty students from schools throughout the Portland area gathered at the club to compete for an individual trophy contributed by the PCC. Tim Coffey achieved a convincing victory by winning all his games.

The traditional Club Championship - a six-round Swiss this year commences on February 28. This tournament is being directed by Robert Barney, a well-known Northwest TD. At least one other major tournament is in the works for this year, and a new Tournament Committee, composed of Bob Barney, Michael Powe, and Tim Erion, is expected to establish a regular tournament program for the Club.

The chess scene in Portland has been fragmented in recent years by squabbles over the proper use of limited available meeting space and by personal differences between leaders of the chess community. The promise of the revitalized Portland Chess Club is the fulfillment of a dream: a permanent chess center where players of all persuasions can play to their hearts' content, and where a variety of chess activities can co-exist in harmony.



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



OPEN LETTER

from John Howell

Chief Organizer of the Metro Chess Club
Portland

The Metro Chess Club was formed to fill a need in the Portland Metro Area. That need was for a club that would serve both tournament and casual players- as well as all sections of the Metro Area, not just central Portland- at a price that was affordable to a large number of players. That need still exists.

It still exists because of the Metro Chess Club's failure to do what was required to fill that need. More directly, my failure to organize the club properly.

It is time for that Metro Chess Club to fulfill that need, or stop wasting the time of Metro Area players. I am still not up to the task of organizing this club.

THE DREAM

1. A club with branches/affiliates in East Portland, West Portland, Gresham, Vancouver, Oregon City and Beaverton. All branches/affiliates would recognize each others membership. With 6 different club sites, the club would go to the players instead of players having to drive many miles to the chess club. Those clubs in lower population areas would be able to draw on the support of the stronger clubs.

2. The branches/affiliates would combine set a slate of tournaments to serve all their areas. Again, the strong areas would help support the weaker areas.

A. **Gresham Open:** 2nd week of January.

B. **Portland Spring Open:** 1st week of May

C. **Rose Festival Open**

D. **Beaverton Open:** 3rd week of October

E. **Autumn Open:** 1st week of December

F. We would like to see a \$1000 Guaranteed prize fund for the Oregon City Open; the Metro Area's best midsummer event. 3rd week of July.

G. Quality bids for the Oregon Category Championship and Oregon Open to the OCF.

3. Affordable membership dues. By having 6 smaller sites, hopefully for free, or low-cost, we are able to keep the dues low and use this money for financing different kinds of programs, not paying rent. We believe, it is better to have 150 players paying \$25 each, then it is to have 60 paying \$60 each.

THE REALITY

1. Nocurrently meeting club sites.

2. \$575 in debts. This includes \$350 to USCF; \$200 to OCF; \$50 to WCF; and \$25 to R.Karch. We have \$50 in cash.

3. Diminished respect and trust in the chess community. I burned out about 18 months ago, and players have suffered from rating reports and memberships submitted late, or not at all; and from tournaments not held, or improperly organized. Playing sites have not been open when they should have; and players have not been adequately informed of the status of the club. All of this is my fault, directly and personally.

4. On the upside, the last two tournaments we ran- the Rose Festival last summer and the Oregon Open- both were well attended and made money (our debt before those tournaments was \$1400). The rating reports and memberships were submitted promptly (except 2 to WCF we are attempting to find).

THE FUTURE

The plan outlined above is good for chess in Portland. To succeed it must have:

1. A real organization with a Board of Directors, constitution, etc.

2. A team of people to keep each club site open and operating.

3. Three or four teams of 4 people each to run the tournaments. This keeps any one person from having to work on more than 2 events/year.

4. Members- at least 40 spread through the 4 or 5 sites.

5. A second chance. I believe this is possible if players look at the good, as well as the bad, in our past history.

We have a reorganization meeting scheduled at MULTNOMAH COUNTY COMMUNITY ACTION AGENCY, 4420 SE 64th, Portland on Saturday, April 30th, at 1:00 pm.

At that meeting we will see what the future is for the Metro Chess Club, and the tournaments it sponsors. Whatever the outcome, I have directed and organized my last tournament outside of the activities of a real and functioning organization of the type listed above

Seattle's Metro High School Chess League finished February 3, 1988. **SHOREWOOD HIGH SCHOOL**, the defending state team champions, cruised to first with 34 of a possible 35 points, an all-time record! Coached by Ollie LaFreniere, the Thunderbirds also won all five all-star medals for best performance at a board. The players: **Chris Schmeekle, Calvin Creger, Young-Sae Song, William Hung and Stefan Persson.**

The runnerups were Cleveland with 23.5 points, coached by Terry Whaley. Their second board, Daniel Chin, was one of only two players in the League to achieve 6 of the seven points, but even this excellent score was insufficient to obtain an all-star medal. Third was O'Dea with 21.5 points, coached by Barrett Corrigan. The Shorewood JV, playing in the varsity division to make an even number of teams, also did very well, reaching third place before having to play their own varsity in the last round. They finished in eighth place with 17 points. The Metro League is Swiss-paired. Fourteen teams played seven rounds. A total of 89 players participated. Only one point of forfeiture was recorded, a fine testament to the enthusiasm of the players. Metro is directed by O.LaFreniere, who is now retiring from league directing after ten seasons.





1.e4 d5 2.exd5 e6. This gambit is good in that it forces White into a critical situation early. 3.Bb5. Dave puts me, also, in the same predicament. 3...e6 4.dxc6 bxc6 5.Be2 Bd6 6.d4 Nf6 7.Nc3 Bb7 8.Nf3 Nbd7 9.0-0 0-0. For the pawn Black has central development, one tempo, and a good control of the b8 to h2 diagonal. 10.b3 Qc7 11.Bb2 e5. To open the e-file and if 12.dxe5 Nxe5 attacks White's main King's defender, the Knight on f3. Dave pointed out that if so, then 13.Ng5 then g3 as an alternative, but I prefer the actual continuation. 12.h3! e4 13.Nd2 Rae8 14.Nc4 Bh2 15.Kh1 Nd5. On 15...e3 16.Nxe3 is strong.

16.Qe1! White has now weakened my e5.d6,c7, and even b7, and is threatening Ba3. So, I play a sacrificial continuation for active counterplay. 16...Bf4 17.Ba3 Re6 18.Bxf8 Rh6. Taking time to recapture the Bishop would be a serious err. 19.Ba3 N7f6 20.Bc1 Bc8. I regretted not having time to examine bringing my Queen into play instead. 21.Nxd5 Nxd5 22.Ne5! Centralizing and interfering on the b8-h2 diagonal. 22...Bxh3 23.Bxf4. Taking the other one loses. 23...Nxf4 24.gxh3 Rxh3 25.Kg1 Qd8 26.Bg4! If 26.f3? Qxd4 27.Qf2 (27.Rf2 Nxe2) Qxe5, or 26.Bc4?? Qg5 mates in two. 26...Qh4 27.Qxe4 Rg3 28.fxg3 Qxg3 29.Kh1. 1/2 : 1/2.
