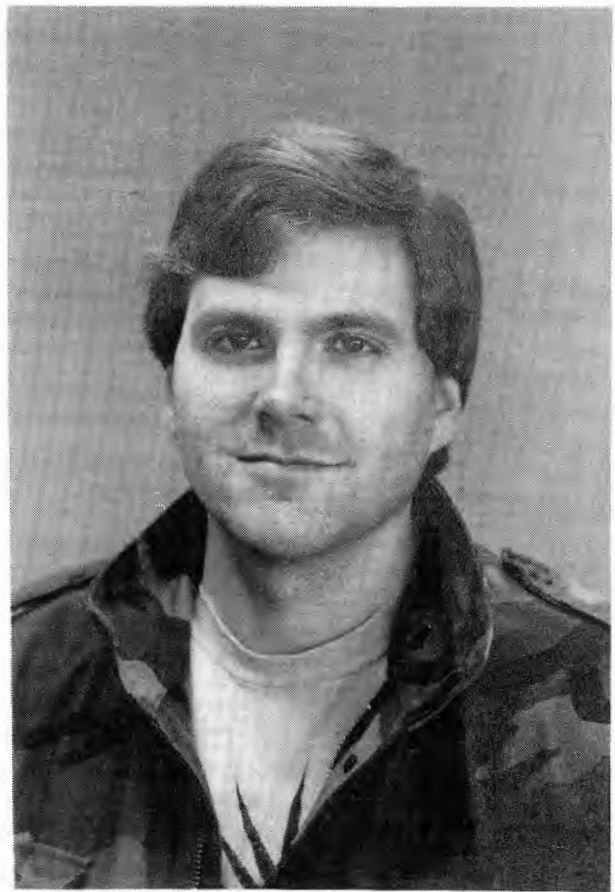

Vancouver Invitational Championship

report by Ralph Dubisch, NM

April 15 - 24, 1989

On April 11, I received a phone call from Henry Chiu. He was organizing a ten player futurity in Vancouver, and he needed a "solid" master to fill out the field; could I play? Well, four days notice seems a bit tight...

Since I had no other commitments (one exception to be noted later), why not?

The FIDE players were: Juri Vetemaa, 2405; Tom O'Donnell, 2395 (CAN 2516); Ralph Dubisch, 2270 (USA 2243); Nigel Fullbrook, 2265 (CAN 2315); Gary Basanta, 2260 (CAN 2320); Elod Macskasy, 2210 (CAN 2264). The unrated: Harry Moore, (CAN 2315); Glenn Morin, (CAN 2309); Paul Brown, (CAN 2300); Lionel Joyner, (CAN 2260).

The tournament winner was apparent after just a few rounds. Juri Vetemaa, a visiting Estonian who has yet to lose in Canada, was notching up the full point easily each round. In fact he scored 8½-½, giving up only a last round lazy draw to Moore. I had to play him in the first round with Black, and it is probably just wishful thinking that I could have achieved more if I had had a few warm-ups first.

Second and third places were fairly well spoken for early in the tournament, too. Tom O'Donnell was clear second with 6½-2½, and I scored a surprise 5½-3½, locking up third. Harry Moore earned a FIDE rating of about 2230 with 5-4, and Lionel Joyner should have a rating around 2215 from his 4½-4½ score.

The one complicating factor for me was that April 15 was my fifth wedding anniversary! Laura came up with me, but due to friends visiting Saturday and an 82 move monstrosity (one adjournment) Sunday, we didn't get to celebrate until Monday evening. We made up for that by celebrating Tuesday, too.

Before presenting some of the games from the event, I want to thank Greg Pond for letting us stay in his flat, and for driving me to the site the last few days. I would also like to thank Henry Chiu for inviting me and for running a controversy free tournament, as well as the players, who seem to genuinely enjoy chess. Special thanks to Henry and Jeremy for distracting Nigel with a backgammon game at strategic moments.

1 e4 e6 2 d4 d5 3 e5 c5 4 c3 Nc6 5 Nf3 Qb6

An invitation to the Milner-Barry Gambit. Lionel has a strongly held opinion that the line favors Black, and has published articles in the B.C. magazine *Counterplay*. His ongoing feud with Nigel Fullbrook is well documented there. If 6 Bd3 cxd5 7 cxd5 Bd7 8 00 Nxd4 9 Nxd4 Qxd4 10 Nc3 Qxe5 11 Re1 Qb8 12 Nxd5 Bd6 13 Qg4 Kf8 14 Bd2 h5 15 Qh3 Bc6 16 Ne3 Nf6 17 Bc3 Be5 we reach the critical position. Joyner claims Black is winning (just look at the bad positions the White Queen and Knight have been forced

into!) while Fullbrook does not agree and has done some home cooking which we will probably see in his next game as White with Joyner. Alas, the colors were wrong in this tournament.

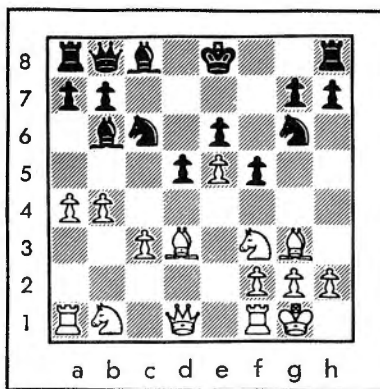
6 dxc5 Qc7

This retreat may be necessary if White has already played Bd3, but in this position 6...Bxc5 7 Qc2 a5 is preferable, with roughly even chances. I like White, but I can see why French players might be satisfied with the Black pieces, too.

7 Bf4 Bxc5 8 Bd3 Nge7 9 b4 Bb6 10 00

Possibly better is 10 Bg3, since 10...Ng6 11 00 Ngxe5? 12 Nxe5 Nxe5 13 Qh5! wins. I expected 10...Ng6 11 Bg3 transposing, but Black took advantage of the pinned e-pawn.

10...f5 11 a4 Ng6 12 Bg3 Qb8!?



Joyner finds an interesting redeployment of Queen and dark squared Bishop to pressure e5. White, however, will be able to defend that point, and after driving the Black knights to bad squares will enjoy a significant space advantage.

13 Re1 Bc7 14 Qe2 00 15 b5 Nce7 16 h4 Bd7 17 Nbd2 Qe8 18 Nb3 h6 19 Nc5 Bc8 20 h5 Nh8 21 Nd4 Qf7 22 f4

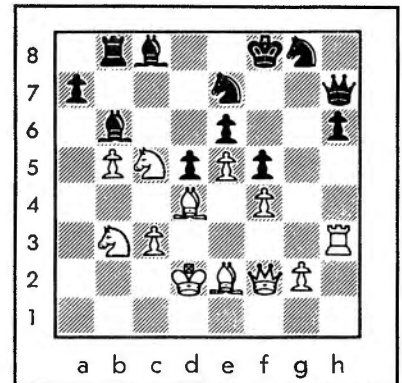
Defending the e-pawn permanently, thereby freeing the Bishop on g3 and incidentally preventing ...f5. Black is forced to defend passively, a losing strategy in the long run.

22...Bb6 23 Ndb3 g5 24 hxg5 Nhxg5 25 a5 Bd8 26 Kf2 b6 27 axb6 Bxb6

Fast forward to time control.

28 Rh1 Kg7 29 Ke1 Ng8 30 Qf3 Qc7 31 Bf2 N6e7 32 Bd4 Rf7 33 Kd2 Kf8 34 Rh3 Rg7 35 Rg3 Rxd3 36 Qxg3 Qd8 37 Be2 Qe8 38 Rh1 Qg6 39 Qf2 Rb8 40 Rh3 Qh7

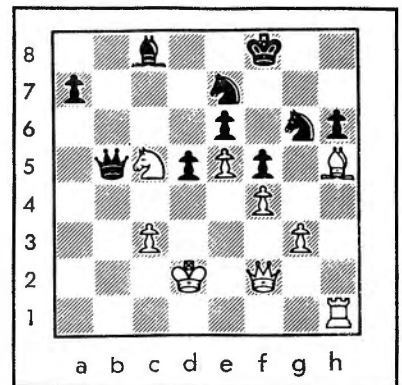

41 Na4! Bxd4 42 Nxd4 Ng6 43 Bh5 N8e7 44 g3 Qf7 45 Rh1 Qe8 46 Nc5!?

Allowing the following liberating attempt, as I felt there was a clear refutation. 46 Be2 maintains the status quo, which is to say White is much better.

46...Rxb5?! 47 Nxb5 Qxb5



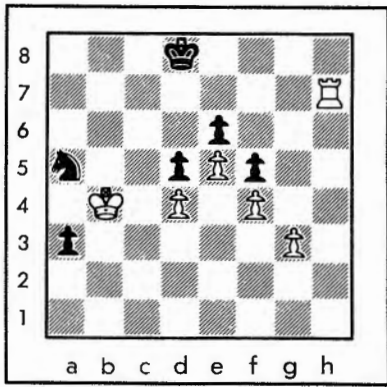
48 Bd1! Nc6 49 Nb3!

Black must not have seen this maneuver when he sacrificed the exchange. Even though he was clearly tired of being tortured, he tests my technique through thirty moves of exchange up ending.

49...Ba6 50 Qc5+ Kg7 51 Qxb5 Bxb5 52 Nd4 Nxd4 53 cxd4 Ne7 54 Be2 Bxe2 55 Kxe2 Nc6 56 Ke3

56 Kd3!

Unclear is 65 Kxa3 Nc6 followed by ...Nxd4. In this position Joyner sealed. 65...Nc6+ 66 Kc5 a2 67 Rh1 Na5 68 Kb4 Nc6+ 69 Kc3, or 65...a2 66 Rh1 Nc6+ 67 Kc3 (same position) is easy for White.

65...Nc4 66 Ra7

With the idea of sacrificing the Rook for Knight and Pawn, leading to a winning King and Pawn ending. This can be verified by putting the White King on e3. If the Black King is on c4, white plays 1 g4 fxg4 2 f5. If the King is on b5, 1 g4 fxg4 2 Kf2 (2...Kc4 3 f5). Black can force the White King to go to e3, but if he goes toward the Kingside instead, White captures the e-pawn.

66...Ne3! 67 Kc5

67 Rxa3 Nc2+ followed not by ...Nxa3 but by ...Nxd4!

67...Nc4 68 Kb5 Ke8 69 Ka4 Kd8 70 Kb3 Nd2+ 71 Kxa3 Ne4 72 Rg7 Ke8 73 Kb4 Kf8 74 Rg5!

Now the capture of the Rook leads to the loss of the e-pawn and the game. It's all over soon.

1 e4 c5 2 Nf3 d6 3 d4 cxd4 4 Nxd4 Nf6 5 Nc3 g6 6 g3

A quiet looking move which attempts to control d5 without exposing the Bishop to exchange with a Knight on c4, as in many Sicilian positions. The only theory that I have seen in this position is 6...Bg7 7 Bg2 Nc6 8 Nde2 and White intends to play Nd5. White seems to maintain a slight edge.

6...Nc6

This shows that Tom thinks before playing "automatic" moves like ...Bg7. Now 7 Nde2 might transpose, but Black has options like 7...Ne5!? or 7...Bg4 8 Bg2 Ne5!?. White is probably forced to play f4: then ...Nf3+ can be answered by Kf2. But what happens if Black just retreats ...Nc6? The positions are hard to evaluate, but White's airy Kingside didn't appeal to me.

7 Bg2 Nxd4

Also possible is 7...Bg4, but after 8 f3 the position resembles the Yugoslav Attack, except White's Bishop is on g2 and Black is losing time with his.

8 Qxd4 Bg7 9 b3 00 10 Bb2 Nd7

Else Nd5.

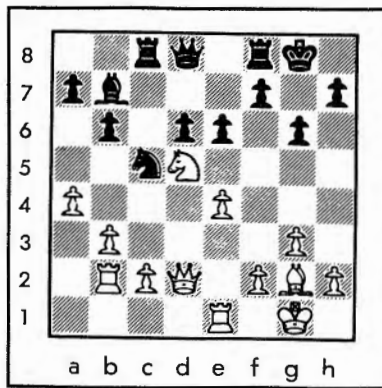
11 Qd2 Rb8!

Intending ...b5 and ...b4. This would cause some problems on the a1-h8 diagonal and on the c-file.

12 a4! b6

Slightly passive, but ...a6 can be met with a5.

13 00 Bb7 14 Rfe1 Nc5 15 Ra2! Rc8 16 Nd5 Bxb2 17 Rxb2 e6



18 Nb4

By a process of elimination. Nc3 blocks the c-Pawn, Ne3 hangs the e-Pawn, Nf4 allows the annoying pin ...Qg5!, so Nb4 intending c4, Na2 and Nc3.

18...Qf6 19 c4

Played quickly, but setting a neat trap: 19...a5 20 Na2 Nd3? 21 e5! Nxe5 22 Bxb7. Black's next threatens ...a5 and ...Nd3, since the b7 Bishop will be guarded.

19...Rc7 20 Rbb1 Rd8 21 Na2 Rcd7 22 Nc3 Qg7 23 Qc2 Na6 24 Rbd1 Nb4 25 Qc1

Now Black cannot break with 25...d5 26 exd5 exd5 27 cxd5 Nxd5 28 Nxd5 Bxd5 29 Bxd5 Rxd5 30 Rxd5 Rxd5 since 31 Re8+ wins the Queen.

25...h5 26 Rd2

26 h4.

26...Qe5 27 Red1 h4 28 Qb2 Bc6!

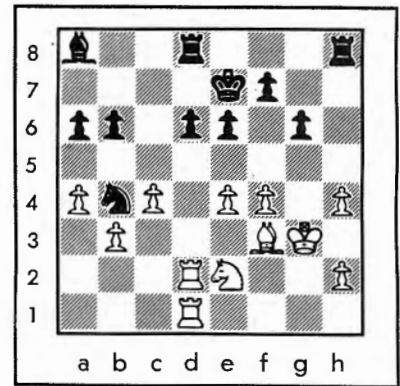
White threatened Nb5, but now 29 Nb5 can be met by 29...Qxb2 30 Rxb2 Bxb5 31 axb5 d5! messing up White's pawn structure while his pieces are disorganized. 29 f4? Qc5+ 30 Kf1 hxg3 31 hxg3 Qe3 is also unacceptable.

29 gxf4 a6 30 Ne2 Qxb2 31 Rxb2 Kg7 32

f4 Kf6 33 Rbd2

Not 33 Rxd6 Rxd6 34 e5+ Ke7 35 exd6 Rxd6 when Black's active pieces more than compensate for the extra, doubled, isolated pawn.

33...Ke7 34 Kf2 Rh8 35 Kg3 Rdd8 36 Bf3 Ba8

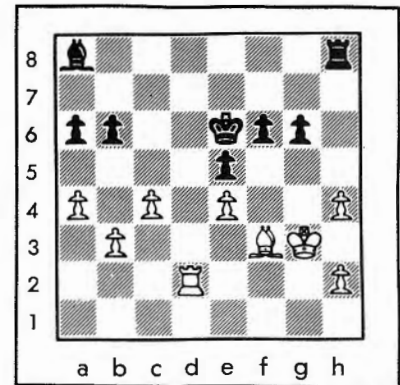


I probably shouldn't make any decisions until time control (move 40), but it seemed natural to attempt the exchange of Black's active Knight. Perhaps Nc1 and Nd3, so the pressure is maintained on the d-file. It may not be possible to forcibly increase White's small edge.

37 Nd4 f6! 38 Nc2 Nxc2 39 Rxc2 e5! 40 fxex5 dxe5

Permanently solving the d-Pawn problem.

41 Rcd2 Rxd2 42 Rxd2 Ke6



Black threatens ...f5.

1 e4 g6 2 d4 Bg7 3 Nf3

Designed specifically for Dr. Macskasy. I don't much like this set-up for White against "normal" Pirc/Modern formations.

3...c6 4 Nbd2 d5

Just ...d6 seems adequate for Black, as the Knight on d2 is slightly misplaced.

5 h3 h5?!

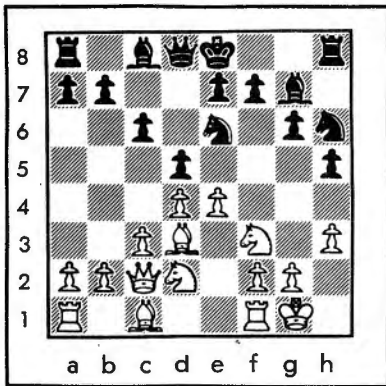
After the game, Macskasy advocated 5...dxe4 6 Nxe4 Nf6 7 Nxf6 exf6 (7...Bxf6 8 Bh6!?). I think White has a fair advantage in that position due to the long term prospects of the 4 vs 3 Queenside majority. White can use his space edge to constantly threaten to play d5, while Black must defend passively. Better may be 5...dxe4 6 Nxe4 Nd7 7 Bc4 although White still has the edge.

6 c3 Nh6 7 Bd3 Nd7?!

If Black wants to put this Knight on e6, a better route is ...Na6 and ...Nc7.

8 Qc2 Nf8 9 O-O Ne6

Threatening ...Nf4.



10 exd5 cxd5 11 Ne5! Nf4 12 Bb5+ Kf8

Black will soon wish there had been a chance to castle.

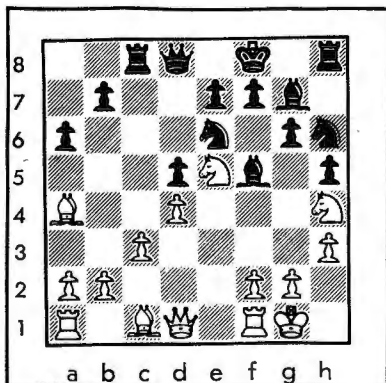
13 Ndf3 a6 14 Ba4 Bf5 15 Qd1 Ne6

Black has managed to develop most of his pieces, but unfortunately they are good targets on their new squares.

16 Nh4

16 Qe2 first may be slightly more accurate.

16...Rc8



Losing. Some hope for short term survival is found in 16...Bxe5, but this doesn't look good for the long term. Now 17 Nxf5 Nxf5 18 Bd7 Rc7 19

Bxe6 Bxe5 20 Bxf7 looks good for White, but I went a slightly quieter route.

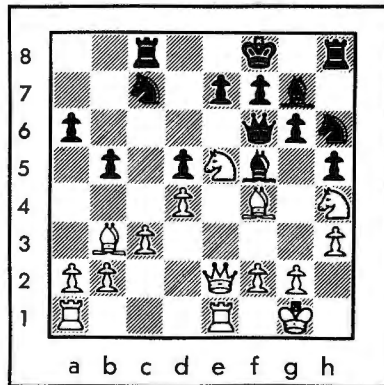

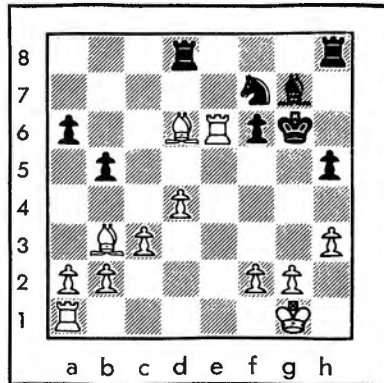

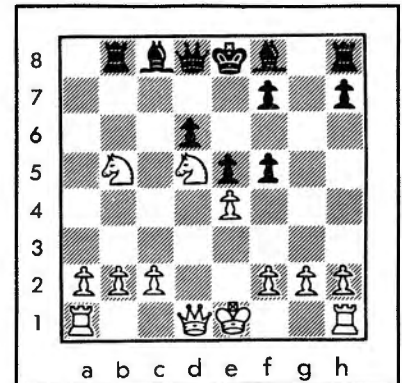

This is the most common move to combat the Sveshnikov (Lasker-Pelikan), however Fullbrook and Basanta both played 6 Nf3 against me. Both had at least one drawn position, and both lost. Moore has a history in this variation, especially against Forbes, and his play was anticipated.

6...d6 7 Bg5 a6 8 Na3 b5 9 Bxf6 gxf6 10 Nd5 f5?!

Yes, I know this is the main line! 10...Bg7 has recent exposure in *Inside Chess*.

11 Bxb5!? axb5 12 Nxb5 Rb8?!



The accepted defence is 12...Ra4, but I had prepared this, and was pleased to give it a tournament trial.

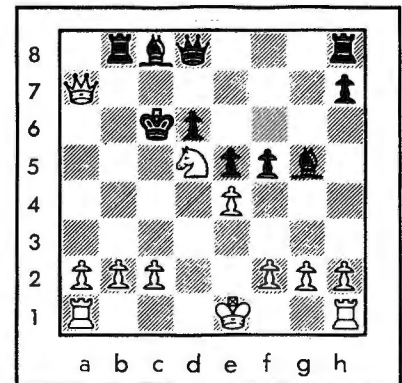

Now the supposedly hot theoretical lines are 16 b4 Nxd5 17 b5+ Rxb5 18 exd5+ Rxd5 with difficult positions and perhaps a small advantage to Black.

Adorjan and Horvath claim a clear plus for Black here.

18 Qa7



18...Rb5

18...Rxb2 19 O-O fxe4 20 e4 followed soon by

Qa4+ and Rb1 depending on the defensive scheme is winning for White. Instead, Black threatens to exchange Queens with...Qa5+.

19 O-O Bb7?

Originally, I intended 19...Rxd5, but 20 Qa8+ Bb7 21 exd5+ Kb6 22 Qxd8+ Rxd8 23 c4 leaves White with a Rook and three Pawns for two Bishops. This must favor White. I failed to analyze properly here, though, since I thought 19...Bb7 threatened ...Ra5 winning the Queen.

20 c4!

Oops! 20...Ra5 21 Nb4+ wins, and 20...Rxb2 21 Qa4+ Kc5 22 Qa3+ is similarly unacceptable. Even worse is 20...Rxd5 21 cxd5+ Kc7 22 Rfc1+ Bxc1 23 Rxc1+ Kd7 24 Qxb7+ Ke8 25 Rc8.

Very dangerous. Of course it's usually a big plus to centralize the King in the endgame. But here the King walks into a combat zone. As Mike pointed out afterward, 27 Bd2 bc3 28 Bxc3 c5 29 Ne2 is at least equal.

For myself, it was clear to me I wasn't thinking clearly; the next five games clarified this opinion.

The following game was played in the fifth and deciding round of the recent Eugene Open (TC 40/90; 30/SD). Joseph, McGeary and Dubisch, all masters, were tied at 3.5 with Mike Pendergast (rated 1968, but a solid expert with recent performances). Pendergast was paired with Ralph Dubisch. Joseph and McGeary had to think a win was the only result that mattered.

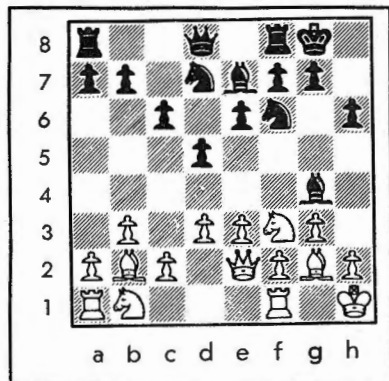

So far, a quiet day in the park. Both sides have developed well, and along recognized paths. White seems to be shooting for e4, the traditional break here.

10 Kh1

Aha! Violence breaks out. In tucking his King safely away, White prepares for a general assault (perhaps with Nh4 and f4).

10...Bg4!?



This move changes the game's character. Now Black can play for ...e5, and instead of fending off an attack he can play to block up the center. This change suits both sides, though.

At Eugene, the Washington masters McGeary and Dubisch displayed a definite preference for the Bishops, and Mr. Joseph must soon give one up.

11 Nbd2 Qc7 12 h3 Bxf3 13 Nxf3 a6 14 e4 de4 15 de4 e5 16 h4

16 Nh4 looks better. The plan would then be to launch a full-scale attack, the open lines after f4 favoring White's Bishops.

McGeary might seek to manufacture chances in the middlegame, except for Joseph's pernicious defense.

White has passed on several chances to make a draw with Ba3-xc5. McGeary (believing in his Bishops?) has not gone all out. Joseph also continues quietly ~ centralizing his men and seeking the best posts for them after the trades.

23...Be7 24 Kh2 Rxd2 25 Rxd2 Rd8 26 Rxd8+ Bxd8 27 Qd2 Bc7 28 Ba3 Bd6 29 Qa5

Another jab, but Manuel's guard was down. On 29 Bxc5! Bxc5 30 Qd8+ followed by Bh3, White can force a trade of Queens and win a pawn by Bc8. If White tries to avoid this endgame by 30...Bf8 31 Bh3 Qg6 32 Bf4 Qh5, 33 g4 will win the Black Queen. The pawn up Bishops of opposite color endgame offers White chances. He can force Black's pawns onto white squares, making inroads for his King and frustrating Black's Bishop. And Black could not even hope for a win.

29...Qe7 30 Bc1 Ne6 31 Be3 Bc5 32 Bxc5 Qxc5 33 Qxc5 Nxc5

White has achieved a B vs N ending with pawns on both wings: theoretically, he has the chance. But White's pawn on e4 limits his Bishop's freedom. These positions can easily develop the characteristics of a closed game, where the Knight is more at home.

34 f3 Kf8 35 Bh3 Ke7 36 b4 Ne6 37 c3 b6!

Black cannot allow his pawns to be locked onto white squares.

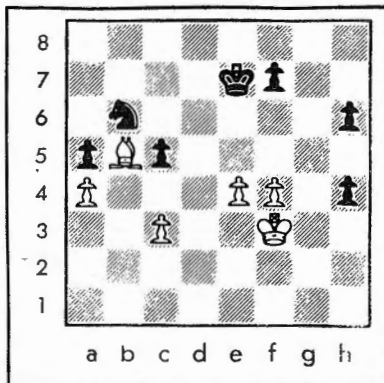

Black has blockaded the position, and White's winning chances are almost nil. Though not going after the win directly, Joseph has subtly split the board into smaller sectors where his Knight works well.

A critical error made in a desperate effort to generate play.

47...f5!!

The move wins.

Dubisch won his game, and tied Joseph at 4½ for a share of first place and \$127.50.

Herman Chiu (2269) vs Hitech (2400)
Great Games Festival
Portland Hilton, Jan 14-15, 1989

Annotated by Michael J. Morris (M) and Herman Chiu. Morris' notes were prepared first; then Chiu's notes were added later.

One of the highlights of the Great Games Festival, was the match between Hitech, Carnegie-Mellon University's inhuman chess playing computer, and Herman Chiu, Oregon Co-Champion. Herman obtained a dangerous attack, but was unable to pull Hitech's plug. During the game I provided the commentary (trying as best as possible to keep up with the complication) to an enthusiastic group of spectators.

1 Nf3 d5 2 g3 Nc6 3 d4 Bf5 4 c4 e6 5 Bg2 dc4

The pawn capture is suspect because it opens, the long diagonal for White's bishop. One common criticism of computer programs is their emphasis on material gain rather than positional advantage. In this game Hitech, which has in the past avoided such criticism, sacrifices development of its pieces to hold on to its extra pawn.

6 00 Qd6 7 Na3 Qb4 8 Bd2 Qb2 9 Nc4 Qb5 10 Rc1 Be4

Apparently played to neutralize the pressure along the long diagonal, but resulting in further loss of time. Now White obtains a strong attack.

11 Bf4 000 12 a4 Qb4 13 Nce5 Bf3 14 Bf3 Ne5

If 14...Nd4 15 Nf7! Nf3+ 16 ef Rd1 17 Rfd1 Black must give back the Queen to prevent mate.

15 Be5 c6 16 Rb1 Qc3 17 Rb3 Qa5

Only move.

18 Qb1 Qa6 19 Rc1

19 d5! +- f6 (19...Rxd5 20 Bxd5 leads to checkmate) 20 dxc6 fxe5 21 cxb7+ Kb8 22 Rc1, winning with the threat of 23 Rc8+ Rxc8 24 bc8+

Kxc8 25 Bb7+ winning the Queen (Chiu)

19...Ne7

There is not time for 19...f6 because of 20 Rb7!

20 Rbc3

A safer plan was 20 e3, threatening 21 Be2 Qe2 22 Rb7, for example 20...Ng6 21 Rc6+ bc 22 Rb8+ Kd7 23 Rd8+ Kd8 24 Qb8+ Qc8 25 Bc7+! Kd7 26 Bc6+ Kc6 27 Qc8 Bd6 28 Bd8+. 20...Nd5 is met by 21 Qb2 threatening 22 Be2. (Morris)

20 e4! (intending Be2,Rxb7) Ng6 21 Be2 Qxe2 22 Rxb7 Nxe5 (forced) 23 de5 c5 (forced) 24 Rb8+ and wins. (Chiu)

20...f6 21 Rc6!?

21 Bxc6 also wins. (Chiu)

21...bc6 22 Qb8+ Kd7 23 Qc7+ Ke8 24 Rc6 Qa4 25 Re6 Qd1+!?

White has courageously sacrificed a Rook, knowing that the computer should be able to flawlessly analyze its way through the maze of tactical complications. However, here Hitech makes an unexplainable move. 26 Bc6+ was threatened, but 25...Qa1+ avoids the loss of the Queen which follows. (Morris)

25...Kf7! is unclear. I prefer Black. White might have to backtrack to find a solid win. (Jay Collins)

26 Kg2 fe5 27 Bc6+ Kf7 28 Qd8 Ke6 29 Qd7+ Kf6

29...Kf7 was not possible because of 30 Bd5+ Kg6 31 Qe6+ Kh5 32 Bf3+ Kg5 33 h4 mate.

30 de5+ Ke5 31 Qd1

31 f4+ Kf6 (forced) 32 Qxd1 Nxc6 33 Qa4 wins the a-pawn, and then White could hardly be losing. On 33...Nb4 34 Qxa7 e4 White has winning chances with his passers. (Chiu)

31...Nc6 32 f4+?

The game was being played under a time control of 40 moves in 2 hours. Chiu had about one minute left to make his remaining 9 moves. After 32 Qd7 he captures the dangerous passed pawn on the a-file.

32...Ke6 33 e4 Nb4 34 Qb3+ Kd7 35 Qa4+ Nc6 36 Qb5 Kc7 37 Qd5 a5! 38 e5 a4 39 Qf7+ Kb6 40 Qc4 a3 41 Qb3+ Bb4

At long last the Black Bishop and Rook join the game. White is powerless to stop the advance of the a-pawn.

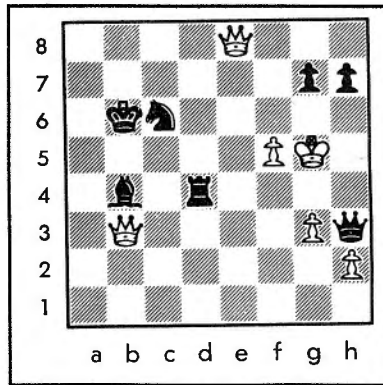

If 47 Kh4 Rd4+ 48 g4 Rd3! wins one of the

A delightful position! Black threatens mate at h6 and g4 and White's two Queens cannot save the game. In fact, Hitech's operators reported at this point that the computer announced a forced mate in 13 moves!

After the game I spoke with Hans Berliner about the performance of his brainchild. Berliner was surprised at the problems Hitech had in playing the opening, in particular 5...d4 and 6...Qd6. He also felt tht Hitech would have been in serious trouble after 19 d5. Chiu gave the machine a scare and Berliner left me with the impression that he was about to take out his screwdriver and do some tinkering.

Linn-Benton Open

January 28-29, 1989

Report by Jay Collins

Yew Chiang Ong was the overall winner with 4½. In the final round, he defeated Rodolpho Abero (an expert from Vancouver WA) who was in sole possession of first at 4-0.

As White from a stonewall formation, Ong sacked a piece for several pawns, denuding the Black King. Rodolpho managed to reach an ending; but with just a piece in compensation for five connected passed pawns, he could only hope to complicate matters. Ong was up to the task, and took away \$96.00.

Manuel Joseph and I joined Abero at 4 points for a share of 2nd and 3rd (\$27.00 each). Mikeal Davis, Gordon Holcomb, and Bobby Anderson tied for the "A" prize, Dean Bollman won 1st "B" and Albert Babcock and Thomas Lin tied for the "C" prize money all at 3 points! Ronald Rutherford and Ethan Nissani tied at 2 points for "D/E/UNR".

Besides being Yew Ong's second US tournament, this was also his second victory. (He is an exchange student from Singapore and attending Oregon State.)

In the Great Pumpkin Open (10/88), I had Black against him in the last round. And I needed the full point. Ong, otherwise quite friendly, had simply crushed his previous opponents with tactics. Soon into the game, though, I thought I was in the clear. I had the center, and was pressing on the Queen-side. After I missed an

opportunity to force a won endgame, White's Queen put-putted towards my King. Immediately, I found myself in a tough defensive position. He was lucky to draw, but I was fortunate the perpetual was not mate.

Dan Roger's Albany-based tournaments have drawn very tough fields. Whereas the Gresham Open had only a few 2000+ players, the Linn-Benton had two masters and five strong experts, with 28 players overall. (And I thought everybody good would be in Seattle watching Karpov-Hjartarsson.)

OCF Report

By Lewis Richardson

1. Minutes of the General Membership Meeting held February 26, 1989.

A. The meeting was called to order by President Mike Morris at 1:30 pm.

B. A motion was made and passed to approve the minutes, as posted, of the last general membership meeting held September 4, 1988.

C. The Treasurer's Report was approved. A summary of the report is given here (a copy of the full, 5 page report can be obtained by sending a self-addressed stamped envelope to OCF Treasurer's Report, 1136 14th Street, Astoria, Oregon 97103). The OCF's net worth was \$8,071.32 including \$283.00 in property and \$301.09 in accounts receivable.

Summary of Income: \$7,950.73 (Entry fees \$5,613.00, Memberships \$1,697.50, Miscellaneous \$503.52, Interest \$136.71). Summary of Expenses: \$7,856.17 (Tournament expenses \$6,335.45, memberships and subscriptions \$1,145.50, Operating expenses \$375.22).

Breakdown by Event: Or. Jr. Closed -\$83.00, Oregon Open -\$47.09, Portland Fall Open -\$82.68, Great Pumpkin Open -\$152.62, Portland Tornado -\$236.79, and Gresham Open -\$47.75. The Treasurer noted that, since John Howell had given the OCF \$50.00 just prior to the meeting for tuition collected at the Donaldson seminar last June, the accounts receivable and income figures were no longer accurate.

D. Old Business: John Howell told the membership that he considered the \$200 that the Metro Chess Club owed to the OCF for dues collected but not forwarded to be his debt. He said that he believed that the OCF Board of Directors had approved the concept of his working off this debt by performing organizing tasks for the OCF. Referral to the Board of Directors' minutes indicated that such a proposal had not been voted on by the Board. A motion was passed that:

a) The OCF allow John Howell to work off his (the Metro Chess Club) \$200 debt by performing organizing tasks for the OCF,

b) That he be given 12 months to work off his debt and after 12 months any balance would revert to a monetary debt, and

c) The Board of Directors will make an honest effort to find appropriate tasks for him to perform.

E. New Business: John Howell wanted the record to indicate that he was not informed of the time and the place where OCF Board of Directors reviewed and awarded the bids for the 1989 Oregon Open. He felt that, since he had submitted a bid, he should have had a right to attend the meeting.

Ray Wissig made a motion that the OCF hold a workshop for members who are interested in organizing chess events. Motion passed. It was indicated that this might be an appropriate task for John Howell to perform.

Mike Morris asked the membership for ideas of events and activities that they would like to see the OCF organize. A request for more action events, some of which would not be rated, was made. Also, it was suggested that the OCF try to do more to promote chess in schools. Meeting was adjourned.

2. The OCF Board of Directors awarded the bid for the 1989 Oregon Open to Lewis Richardson and a group of co-sponsors. The tournament will have a \$5,000.00 prize fund and will be held in Portland.

3. The OCF hosted a joint meeting and match with the WCF officers and the OCF Board of Directors at Mt Hood Community College on April 2. WCF officers attending were President Robert A. Karch, Secretary Fred Kleist, Treasurer Russell Miller, and Tournament Coordinator Dennis L. Ambler. OCF officers attending were President Mike Morris, V-P Bob Barney, Sec-Treas Lewis Richardson, Tournament Coordinator Korneljijs Dale, Scholastic Coordinator Mark Turner, Voting member Evan Whipple, Voting member John Martin, and USCF Delegate for Oregon Ralph Hall. The officers of both Federations agreed:

A) To continue the policy of accepting each other's memberships as fulfilling

state membership requirements at tournaments sponsored or sanctioned by each federation,

B) That each federation would continue to collect memberships for the other federation,

C) That each federation would not sell memberships in their organization to residents of the other federation's state,

D) To continue through September 1990 the policy of not sponsoring or sanctioning events competing (within a week of) against the Oregon Open (Labor Day Weekend) and Washington Open (Memorial Day Weekend).

E) To initiate an annual Oregon-Washington Match to rotate between Seattle and Portland, with the first match tentatively scheduled to be a 30-board match held on Saturday, August 12 in Seattle and hosted by the WCF. Presidents Morris and Karch will arrange the details.

F) To jointly sponsor a NWC Senior Championship with the first championship to be held in the late spring of 1990. Robert Karch and Ralph Hall will arrange the details.

G) That there should be a NWC team championship, and

H) That there has been a lack of crosstables in recent issues of NWC and requested that the editor of NWC include crosstables of Oregon and Washington events in future issues of NWC.

4. At the OCF Board of Directors meeting held in conjunction with the joint OCF-WCF officers meeting, the board voted to:

A) Give a free entry into the 1989 Oregon Junior Open to the three players achieving a perfect score at this year's OSCF/OMSI Individual state finals.

B) Co-sponsor the 1989 Great Pumpkin Open, a \$1,000 prize one section tournament to be held October 28-29 in Albany.

C) Co-sponsor the 1989 Oregon City Open, a \$750 prize fund one section tournament to tentatively be held Sept 23-24 in Oregon City,

D) Authorized Mike Morris to look into chartering a bus (\$250 maximum) to take players to the Oregon-Washington match. The board will decide later whether or not to pass on none, part or all of the cost.

E) Approved the 1989 Oregon Junior Open agreement between Mark Turner and OCF,

F) Discontinued multiple year discount for combined OCF/USCF/NWC and OCF/USCF memberships. (Primarily, reason being that NWC no longer offers a discount for multiple year subscription.),

G) To allow a modified pro-rated conversion of adult OCF only memberships to adult OCF/NWC memberships, and

H) Authorized Bob Barney to contact John Howell about organizing a workshop/seminar for organizers.

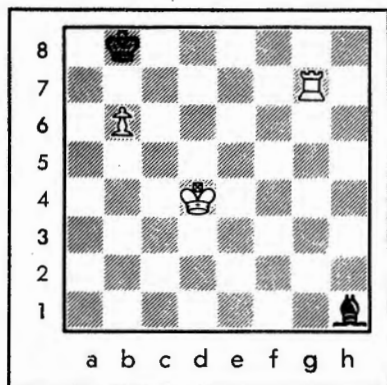
5. The 1989 Grants Pass Open Co-sponsored by Greater Oregon Health Service drew 46 players, which is the top attendance in its fifteen year history. The \$466 loss was shared equally between the OCF and Greater Oregon Health Service. The OCF wishes to thank Greater Oregon Health Service for its support of Chess in Oregon.

6. The OCF is actively seeking proposals to sponsor or co-sponsor chess events, particularly outside of the Portland metropolitan area. Please send your proposals and/or suggestions to OCF President, Mike Morris, 2344 NE 27th, Portland, Oregon 97212.

7. There are over 250 members in the OCF and only 11 Officers. The Officers need your help. We would like to see more chess events held in Oregon, but lack the manpower to organize more events. If you are willing to help organize a chess event please contact Mike Morris.

Odds & Ends: The Battling Bishop

by Ralph Dubisch, NM



Ordinarily, the ending involving king, rook and pawn against king and bishop is an easy win. The side with the rook should advance his king to the sixth rank in front of his pawn, forcing the opponent's monarch to one side, then push the pawn and make a queen. The ending is tricky in two cases: 1) when the pawn has already rushed forward too fast, 2) if the pawn is on the edge of the board.

When the pawn interferes with the strategy of putting the White king on the sixth rank, as in the first diagram, winning requires some finesse.

1 Kc5 Bf3 2 b7! Ka7!

The only way to win this is to give up the pawn at just the right moment to transpose into one of the unusual rook vs bishop winning positions. Remember that the way to draw that ending is to head into a corner where the square is the opposite color from the squares the bishop travels on, then play for stalemate. 2...Bxb7? 3 Kb6 Bc8 4 Rg8 doesn't draw because the Black king can move.

3 Rc7!!

The only way to win! White's last two moves are necessary to trap the Black king in the wrong corner, although White does not absolutely have to play them on these particular moves. 3 Kd6 Kb8! 4 Kc5 Ka7 wastes time, but 3 Kd6 Bxb7? 4 Kc7 Ka6 5 Rg6+ Ka7 6 Rb6 Be4 7 Rb4 Bc2 8 Rb2 wins. Now 3...Bxb7 4 Kb5 Kb8 5 Kb6 holds no hope for Black, so...

3 ... Be4 4 b8/Q+! Kxb8 5 Kb6 Bb1

This extends play for a bit, since most other moves allow the rook to threaten both the bishop and a back rank check.

6 Rc1 Ba2 7 Rc2 Bb3

7 ... Bb1 8 Rb2 drives the bishop out to the open board.

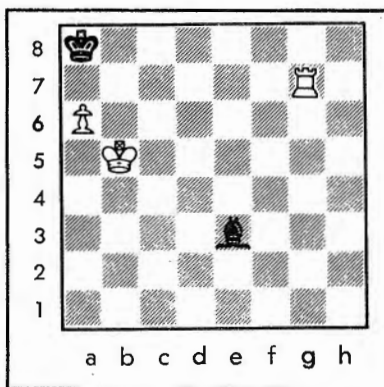
8 Rb2 Be6(!)

Setting one last trap. 8...Ba4 9 Ka5+ or 8...Bc4 9 Kc5+.

9 Re2 Bd7 10 Rf2! White wins.

NORTHWEST CHESS

The trick is 10 Rd2? or 10 Re7? are both met by 10...Kc8 with a draw. Now 10...Kc8 11 Rf8+.



Black has few worries here, as the draw can be secured by moving the bishop to safe squares along the g1-b6 diagonal and meeting rook checks by playing Ka7.

1 ... Ba7??

Nooo! I said g1-b6! The drawing technique without the pawn (interpose the bishop) leads to disaster here.

2 Rg8+ Bb8 3 Rh8

3 Rf8 Ka7 4 Rf7+ Ka8 5 Kb6 Bd6 6 a7 Bc5+ 7 Ka6 Be7 8 Rg7 Bf8 9 Rc7 is another reliable way to win.

3...Ka7 4 Rh7+ Ka8 5 Kb6 Be5 6 Ra7+!

6 a7? trying to win as in the last note doesn't work with the rook on h7: 6...Bd4+! 7 Ka6 Bg7!! 8 Rh4 Bd4! 9 Rh7 Bg7! 10 Kb6 Bd4+ 11 Kc7 Kxa7 12 Rh4 Be5+ or 11 ... Be5+ 12 Ka6 Bd4 draws! (but not 11 ... Bxa7? 12 Rh8+).

6...Kb8 7 Rd7 Ka8

7...Kc8 8 a7 Bd4+ 9 Kc6.

8 a7 Bd4+ 9 Ka6 Bb6

Hoping for 10 Rb7? Bc7! 11 Rb5 Bb6 forcing stalemate or the win of the pawn.

10 Re7 Bd8 11 Rg7 Bc7 12 Rg8+ Wins.

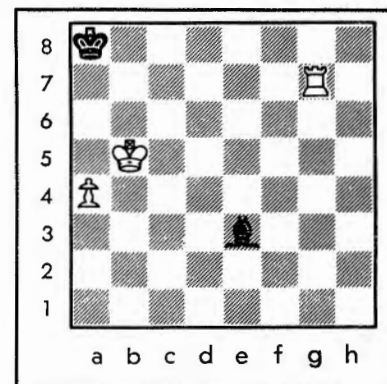
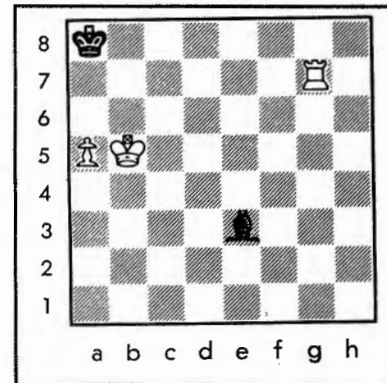
With the edge pawn on the fifth the standard positions are still drawn. Although the Black king can be driven out of the corner, no further progress is possible.

(See Diagram , top next column.)

1 Ka6 Kb8 2 Rb7+ Kc8!

2...Ka8? 3 Re7 Bf4 4 Re8+ (or 4 Kb6 Bg3 5 Ra7+ Kb8 6 Rf7 Ka8 7 a6) 4...Bb8 5 Kb5 Ka7 6 a6 Bg3 7 Re7+ Ka8 8 a7.

3 Rb6 Kc7 4 Ka7 Bf2 Draw.



This is perhaps the most complicated case. With the pawn no further advanced than the fourth rank, it is possible to win by forcing the Black king out of the corner then extricating the White king from the rook file and pushing the pawn.

1 Ka6 Kb8 2 Rb7+ Kc8 3 Rb5!

Trying to get the king out via a5 and b4: 3...Bf2 4 Ka5 Be1+ 5 Kb6 Kb8 6 Rf5.

3...Kc7!

To meet 4 Ka5 with 4...Bd2+.

4 Rb3 Bf2

4...Bd4 5 Kb5 Kb7 6 Kc4+ Bb6 7 a5.

5 Ka5! Kc6

5...Be1+ 6 Kb5 Kb7 7 Rf3 and the bishop cannot return to the right diagonal.

6 Rb5! Be1+ 7 Ka6 Kc7 8 Rb7+ Kc6

8...Kc8 9 Kb6 Ba5+ 10 Kc6.

9 Rb1 Bd2 10 Rb2 Be3 11 Rc2+ Bc5 12 a5 Kd6 13 Rxc5 Kxc5 14 Kb7 Wins.

Followed by promoting the pawn. Also insufficient is 11 ... Kd7 12 Kb7.

Study simple endgame positions! It is here that the interaction of various pieces and themes can be seen in isolation.

Thematic is 13 a4! preventing Black's Q-side expansion: ...b5, ...Nb6 and ...Bb7.

13...b5!?

After 14 Bxd6! Bb7 15 Bf3 b4 16 Na4 Bxd5 17 Nxc5 Black does not have sufficient compensation.

14 Qc2?

The pawn on d5 is the apex of White's position, however.

1989 Wash State Elementary Championship Report by John K. Wise

On Saturday, March 4, 248 elementary school chessplayers gathered to Onalaska, Washington to compete in the 1989 Washington State Elementary Chess Championship. Most of the entering students had qualified previously to play in the Championship by competing in state regional tournaments.

Organizer **Fred Thornton** supervised the event, with the help of numerous other volunteers, and after some slow pairings in the first few rounds, the day-long tournament was concluded with the tournament leaders playing tie-breaking 5-minute games to decide the final placement.

Emerging undefeated from the hotly contested matches was sixth-grader **Kweilin Moore**, who dispatched one opponent after another (including high placers in last-year's event), without giving up so much as a draw! During the final playoff, Kweilin's main strength was her ability to think clearly under the pressure of 5-minute chess.

Of the 21 schools sending teams, the top team was Riverside Elementary, coached by **Dan Barnes**, from Vancouver. Close behind in second place was Orchards Elementary, coached by **Warren Berry**, also from Vancouver.
