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Chess Journalists of America Awards

Northwest Chess is proud of our contributors and columnists! We submitted over 20 entries for the Chess Journalists of America (CJA) 2026 awards, and the results are in.

The magazine again won the Cramer awards for best state or regional publication in both print and online categories.

Wilson Gibbins took the Cramer award for best state championship coverage (Oregon Closed), in the April 2026 issue. Wilson also won the Cramer award for best state tournament report (Oregon Junior Championship), February 2026 issue. To complete his trifecta, Wilson won in the Print Articles, local and regional category, for his Oregon Open story, November 2025 issue.

Our own editor, Jeffrey Roland, also personally won three awards: Visual Arts, photo journalism, for his story on the ICA January Alchemist Coffee House Swiss tournament (March 2026 issue); the Cramer state magazine photo, "Old School," that appeared on the back cover of June 2025 issue; and the Cramer best photograph, "Tom Booth," from the Alchemist story mentioned above.

In the Online & Social Media category, The Chess Friends won the award for best humorous contribution, "Chess Smiles," April 2026 issue. Meiling Cheng got two honorable mentions, one for her picture of Siana Razmov being exuberant in front of the chess balloons (May 2026 issue), another for her shot of Sofia Michael at the Detective Cookie tournament back cover, July 2025 issue.

Finally, we submitted 60 pages of scholastic coverage, mostly written by Josh Sinanan, earning an honorable mention in the scholastic category under Cramer.

Writing and Coaching

Like Vivaan said, competing is fine, and while I thoroughly enjoyed winning the U11 US Junior Open in 2024 among other titles, it's the sharing and giving back that matters the most to me. From the age of six, I wrote daily and journaled. At eight, I wrote my first book, [Do Brown Cows Make Chocolate Milk?: Family Experiences Around Child-Led Learning](#), with my Dad, Mom, and little brother The Legend Vivaan. The experience of sharing my voice with people of all ages from all over the world totally changed my perspective on life.

Shortly thereafter, I got to writing even more with my buddy The Man Benji, and [The Chess Friends](#) were born. Since then, we've been [blogging](#), writing articles for *Northwest Chess* magazine, and published one book, [Q&A Chess: Tournament Edition](#), with another in the works (stay tuned!). Hearing stories from

so many about how our writing has helped them means the world to me. Meeting Benji weekly and sharing ideas and writing in a way that helps other kids and adults alike appreciate the chess world is super rewarding! After taking several college writing courses, I also started my own blog, ProdigyStrats.com, to help people get a glimpse into my world and hopefully help them in theirs, whether through chess, music, cooking, gaming, sports, travel, or yoga.

Coaching chess has been a major highlight for me this past year. I helped coach the King's High School Chess Team in their inaugural season and they got second at State Individual! More than that, all the players improved considerably, and I'm proud of the team chemistry I helped facilitate. I now have multiple private students and work with a free by-kids-for-kids chess school, which you can learn about at PawnToQueenChessCoaching.com. I've particularly enjoyed talking chess pedagogy with Coach Tim Moroney and other leaders in the Northwest Chess community and love designing new curriculum and helping fellow strong kid chess players into coaching as well. Now let's turn it over to my fellow author and dear friend The Man Benji to share his brightest chess moments.

The Man Benji

The Light of the Game

When I think of my brightest chess hours, I don't remember winning a tournament, gaining rating, or taking a trophy home. What comes to mind is the

game itself. When I play chess, I enjoy thinking hard about a position and using all my brainpower to find brilliant and flashy moves. That is the source of chess light for me. Do you know those light bulb moments in your head? That's what I play for, even if the end result is losing a game. Experimenting and coming up with ideas, even if they end up being errors, is part of the process.

Like the second World Chess Champion Emanuel Lasker, who said, "Without error there can be no brilliancy," I think that *Yesterday's errors can become tomorrow's brilliancies, if you let them teach you.*

For example, I might be trying a new opening for the first time at a tournament. It might not work out well, which is understandable since it's new. So, I would play on, but lose more games with it. I could get disappointed, to put it mildly, and sink into a dark hour, thinking that it's the opening's fault, or worse, it's my fault! Or I could convert these unproductive thoughts into energy that powers me to study what went wrong in that line. Then, in the next tournament, I might get better results, and the feeling that your hard work has paid off will create another source of light.

Last year, when I wrote about my darkest chess hour, I described a disappointing performance at a tournament. What I didn't realize after that tournament, or even when writing about it a year later, is that it wasn't a dark hour, but a breaking point that fueled the light within. You know glow sticks, those little plastic tubes, that, when you bend them, you break the smaller glass container inside, then the two solutions mix and give off light in a process called chemiluminescence? My process is called *chess-luminescence*, but unlike the disposable glow sticks that last only a

few hours, chess-luminescence keeps on shining!

The thing is, we have to create our own light; that way it shines the brightest. For me, learning chess and trying something new is what creates the light. It's now part of me, a must-have feature, like in creatures that shine their way in the darkest seas and oceans. (Fun fact, in 2008, Dr. Osamu Shimomura shared a [Nobel Prize in Chemistry](#) for his work in bioluminescence, studying luminous jellyfish *Aequorea* right here in Washington, in Friday Harbor on San Juan Island!)

The darkest chess hours are fleeting, but the brightest hours keep shining, illuminating our chess journey forward. Does that mean it's always daytime in chess? When do the chess lights turn off so we can get some rest? When we call it a knight!

Ha! We can't have a celebratory article without our critically acclaimed knee-slappers, can we? Here they are, sunny and bright edition!

What did the light bulb in Benji's head tell him during the chess game?

"Watt's up?"

Why does ice cream play chess only during the long days of summer?

Because when it's summer, anything is popsicle!

What did the sunscreen say to its opponent after losing the chess game?

"Please, don't rub it in."

How many chess players does it take to change a light bulb?

None, that's what TDs are for!

Why do light bulbs play chess?

To practice their brilliance.

2026 Washington Father's Day Open

The 2026 Washington Father's Day Open was held on Father's Day weekend, June 20-21, at Hotel 116 in Bellevue. Players traveling from multiple universes across the North American chess galaxy were represented in the two-day chess fest, including the cities of Bellevue, Redmond, Bothell, Portland, Sammamish, Woodinville, Newcastle, Vancouver (BC), Bremerton, Black Diamond, Everett, Tenino, Edmonds, Silver Spring (MD), Kenmore, Gig Harbor, Issaquah, Renton, Bellingham, Clyde Hill, Coquitlam, Coralville (IA), Beaverton, Olympia, Lynnwood, Lake Forest Park, Hillsboro, Kingston, Seattle, Lakewood, Kent, Ferndale, North Bend, Mercer Island, Buffalo Grove (IL), Hunts Point, Port Townsend, Medina, and University Place! NTD Jacob Mayer, WCF FIDE Liaison Mani Atikankhotchasee, WCF Scholastic Director Allen Messenger, and Des Moines Chess Club Founder Matthew Duran directed the event, which attracted a robust turnout of 138 players in three sections: Yoda Open, Boba Fett U1700, and Chewbacca U1200. All three

sections were triple rated in NWSRS, USCF, and FIDE, much to the satisfaction of the many rising chess stars seeking to establish or improve their local, national, and international ratings. The flexible five-round G/90; +30 format, which featured three games on Saturday and two Sunday, appealed to players of all ages and levels.

Jedi masters GM Vladimir Belous of Woodinville and FM Stephen Willy of Sammamish topped the 54-player Yoda Open, each with an undefeated 4.5 points from five games. Belous vanquished Jedi apprentices Vijayakumar (2247) and Jiang (2275) but was held to a draw in the fourth round by Lee (2333). Wild Willy won his first three games against elder Jiang (1492), Whale (2034), and Summerfield (2190), took a fourth-round half-point bye, and finished strong with a clutch win against Lee (2333) in the final round. Redmond "Red Leader" Harishkumar Karthikeyan earned third place honors, recovering well from a third-round loss against Jiang (2275) to vanquish Oregon TIE fighters Maokhampio (2014) and Saputra (2055)

in the last two rounds. Six intergalactic gladiators joined the resistance and shared the fourth-place prize with 3.5 points apiece: FM Ryan Porter of Bellevue, NM Advait Vijayakumar of Bothell, FM Brandon Jiang of Bellevue, Pranav K. Anoop of Bellevue, CM Rafael Palathingal of Bothell, and Luca Tessiere of Seattle. Coquitlam Commander CM Zachary Liu earned the first U2100 prize with an impressive "plus two" score. Six rising rebel leaders—Miles Kuipers of Bellevue, Anish Lodh of Coralville, Daniel Qian of Bellevue, Pratik Thorwe of Seattle, Yogi Saputra of Portland, and Lucas Maokhampio of Beaverton—split the second U2100 prize with three points apiece. Sammamish saber-twirler Odbayar Yondon collected the first U1900 prize with an impressive 3.5 points. A quadruplet of rookniks split the second U1900 prize with three points: Michael Lin of Sammamish, Vijay Nallappa of Redmond, Karl Reutter of Kent, and Yuntao Liu of Clyde Hill. Several players became one with the force and were recognized a special prize for the biggest upset win, Leia best female player, Han



Solo best dressed, Obi-Won best dad player, and Darth Vader best parent/child team. Winning the biggest upset win prizes were Jacob Rish-Brown (Round 1, 306 points), Vijay Nallappa (Round 2, 169 points), Yuntao Liu (Rounds 3+4, 338 points + 419 points, respectively), and Aarav B. Mohan (Round 5, 155 points). FM Megan Lee won the Best Female Prize with a tournament performance rating (TPR) of 2300, and Hitesh Khamesra earned the Best Dad Prize with a TPR of 1582. Ebullient ewoks Oliver He (Saturday) and Yash Syal (Sunday) were awarded the Best Dressed Prizes for their fleek ensembles. The Father/Son team of Hitesh/Nikhar Khamesra won the Best Parent/Child Prize with a combined average TPR of 1325.

In the Boba Fett U1700 section, a pair of chess bounty hunters, Krishang Gupta of Everett and Mikhail Lagzdin of Redmond, emerged victorious in the 54-player field, each with an undefeated 4.5 points from five games. The two co-champions conquered their rivals in opposite orders, with Lagzdin taking a half-point bye in the first round and Gupta in the final round, while winning each of their other four games. The third/fourth/first+second U1600/first U1400 prizes were shared amongst five stormtroopers, each of whom scored four points from the five games: Moinuddin Mohammed of Sammamish, Liam Naughton of Edmonds, Kartika Kalakoti of Bellevue, Viet Nguyen of Redmond, and Oscar Preiner of Seattle. Woodinville chess wookiee Rithvik Bharath collected the second U1400 prize a half-point back. Several special prizes were also awarded to those who helped good prevail over evil in the chess galaxy. Winning the

biggest upset prizes for their underrated efforts were Rohan Karnik (Round one, 249 points), Oscar Preiner (Rounds two+three+five, 327 points + 433 points + 399 points, respectively), and Tejas Bharadwaj (Round four, 793 points). Eevie Tare of Portland took home the Best Female Prize thanks to her 1407 TPR. The well-dressed ladies Sharanya Pingale (Saturday) and Ishana Datta (Sunday) were recognized for their classy attire. Eastside chess rookie Kaushik Rajan was recognized as the Obi-Won Best Dad Player for thanks to his 1368 TPR.

In the modest 26-player Chewbacca U1200 section, Bellevue chess “padapawn” Sreeram M. Kakarlapudi emerged as named champion with an undefeated 4.5 points from five games. Kakarlapudi began strong, rattling off four consecutive victories against Shi (799), Yadav (899), Ponomarenko (665), and Lin (1088) before being held to a draw by Yin (893) in the final round. A quadruplet of X-Wing pilots in-training shared second/third/fourth/first U1000 honors a half-point back with four points apiece: Evan Lin of Seattle, Hsien-Kai Hsiao of Bellevue, Adrian Ponomarenko of Bellevue, and Vicky Yin of Bothell. Death Star destroyer George K. Joseph earned the second U1000 prize with a solid “plus two” score thanks to a clutch last-round upset victory against Jain (953). Two Endor residents of the Bothell forest moon—Srivatsa Kondapi and Pi Nouveau—shared the first+second U800 prizes with three points apiece. Several special prize winners could be seen celebrating in the Bright Tree Village high above the forest floor. Capturing the Biggest Upset Wins were Pi Nouveau (Rounds one + three + four, 422 points

+ 744 points + 492 points, respectively), Luke Shi (Round two, 392 points), and Anthony Sofronas (Round five, 450 points). Jedi princess Vicky Yin added to her royal winnings by taking home the Leia Best Female Player prize with a TPR of 1073. Light saber wielders Elke Johnson (Saturday) and Vicky Yin (Sunday) were awarded the Best Dressed prizes for their stylish efforts. Hsien-Kai Hsiao, the father of Aaron Hsiao, won the Obi-Wan Best Dad Player prize with a TPR of 1092. The Hsiao family was also honored as the Darth Vader Best Parent/Child team with an average TPR of 1144.

Father's Day Blitz

The Father's Day Blitz tournament took place on the evening of Father's Day Sunday, June 21, shortly after the conclusion of the main tournament. The 49-player field consisted of a diverse mix of dads, future dads, moms, daughters, and sons. The nine-round Single Swiss tournament lasted around two and a half hours and featured players with ratings ranging from unrated to grandmaster, many of whom were keen on establishing or updating their FIDE and USCF blitz ratings. The hypersonic G/3; +2 time control made for several interesting clashes and wild time scrambles, some of which can be found on WCF's [YouTube channel](#).

Power chess couple GM Vladimir Belous of Woodinville and FM Megan Lee of Bellevue shared first + second place honors, each with 7.5 points from nine games. Belous recovered well from a third-round loss against Fletcher (2012)



to set up sixth-round clash with Lee, which ended peacefully. Lee started off red-hot with five consecutive wins against Das (1544), Mohan (1623), Qian (1849), Karthikeyan (1862), and Willy (2161) before drawing against Belous. Lee's seventh-round loss against dark horse Anoop (1922) allowed Belous to catch up, after which the duo won their last two games to share the tile. Bellevue chess Mandalorian Pranav K. Anoop captured third place honors a half-point back, losing only to GM Belous and FM Willy. Redmond chess illuminator Imai

Maharaja captured the first U2000 prize with an impressive six points thanks to clutch wins against Willy (2161) and Qian (1849) in the sixth and seventh rounds, respectively.

Seattle star-destroyer Ziliang Ma earned the first U1700 prize a half-point back thanks to his clutch final-round draw against the deified Gadde (1439). Young chess legionnaire Michael Makienko of Lynnwood earned the first U1400 prize after recovering well from a round start and winning his final four games in a row!

Redmond chess rooknik Tejas Bharadwaj won the first U1100 prize with a solid four-point score. Former California resident and newcomer Matt Wan, who now lives in Tukwila, refused the temptation of the Dark Side and won the first unrated prize with four points thanks to victories against womp rats Avula (1265), Barua (1310), Das (1544), and Bharath (1370)!

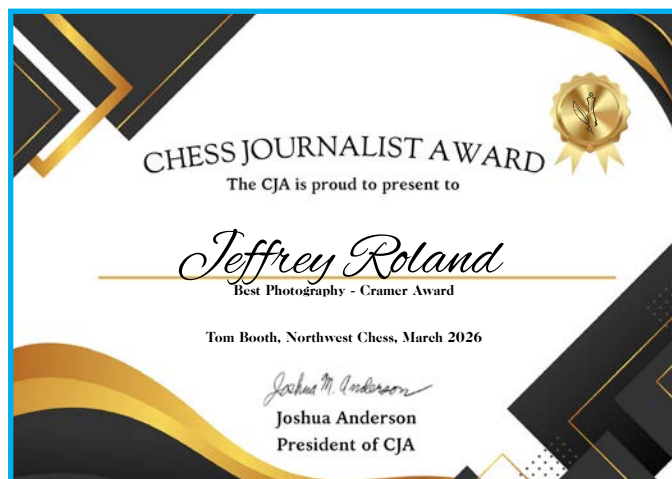
The 2026 Waterland City Open, presented with the generosity of Edward Jones Financial Advisor Doug Myers, featured some of the area's top players, such as 2025 State Champion FM Ryan Porter and recent PNW transplant GM Vladimir Belous. There was also a solid showing of rising young stars finishing near the top of the field, like NM Advait Vijayakumar (recent winner of the 2026 Emerald City Open), Harishkumar Karthikeyan, Jeffrey Wei, Leonardo Wang, and Lucas Maokhampio. Des Moines Chess Club's first classical tournament was also a family affair with father/son duo Chris and Gabriel Pleasants, the Rish-Brown Brothers, and the Maokhampio siblings

(one in each section). On July 11th and 12th 51 players converged on Des Moines—The Waterland City—for the inaugural five-round event. Spread across three sections—Open, U1700, and U1300—the field included a range of players, from those competing in their first rated event up to Grandmaster, and from first grade to senior citizen. After a weekend of fierce competition GM Vladimir Belous proved unbeatable, finishing in a clear first place with 4.5/5 (+4-0=1) relinquishing only .5 point to Jeffrey Wei in a round two draw. Other top competitors Porter and Vijayakumar were also held to draws in round two by Leonardo Wang and Alex Chow, respectively. Sunday's final rounds proved the biggest challenge for Belous

as he had to go through Vijayakumar in round four and Porter in round five, scoring wins in both to secure the victory.

The U1700 section was dominated by rising young talent Brenden Keane, who cruised to clear first with 4.0/5 (+4-1=0) scoring wins over veterans Allen Hall, and Anthony Lamb. Only second-place finisher Chris Pleasants was able to score against him in the final round. After his tremendous showing in Des Moines, Keane followed it up with another first-place finish in the U1700 section of the Eastgate Cup the following weekend, July 18-19.

Newcomers Brandon Aviado and Lars Hosea, both playing in their first

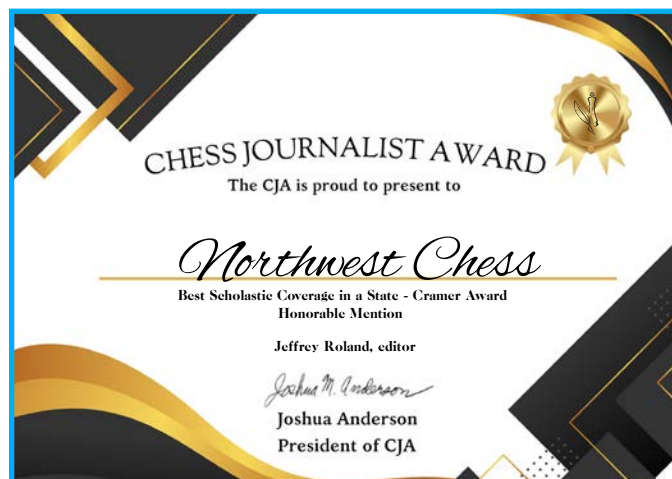

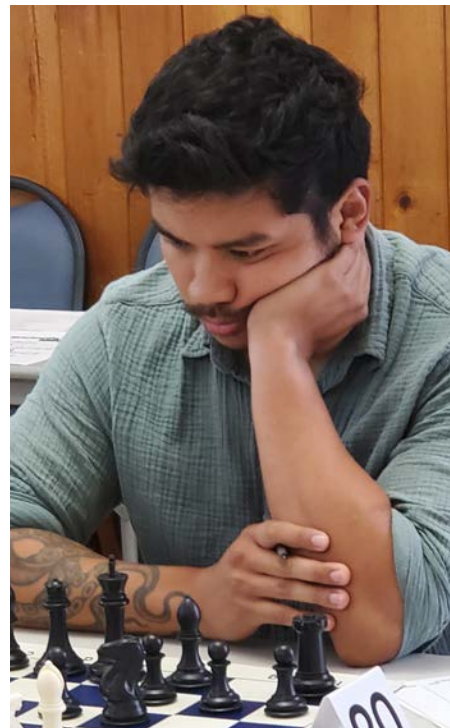
